CORN AND OATS. Chicago, April 7.—Corn showed considerable weakness today, but rallied when the fact developed that country offerings, although of liberal volume, were mostly held above the market. Asking prices were said to be too high as compared with the May option. Assertions that an increased acreage of corn was in prospect as compared with recent estimates had only a transient bearish effect.

OPENING PRICES, which ranged from 1-8 cent and 2-4 cents lower, with May at \$1.85 to \$1.86 and July \$1.47 to \$1.47-3-4, were followed by upturns that in some cases reached well above Saturday's finish.

OATS, like corn, quickly showed an oversold condition. After opening 3-8 cent off to 1-4 cent advance, with May at 66 3-4 to 67 cents, the market underwent a moderate general sag and then scored a material advance.

Provisions were dull but firmer in sympathy with hogs. The live animals rose to a new top level, for 1919.

KILLED IN EXPLOSION ON S. S. CAPE BRETON

Five lives were lost and three men were injured when the bottom blew out of the combustion chamber of the port boiler of the Dominion Coal Company's steamer Cape Breton, while she was on her way from St. John's, Nfld., to Louisburg.

When the news was received in St. John's a vessel was dispatched with doctors and nurses and the injured were taken to the St. John's hospital. The Cape Breton was towed back to St. John's.

The dead are Chief Engineer C. B. McArthur, Second Engineer W. Scott, Donkeyman K. McDonald and two Chinese firemen. The injured were Third Engineer M. Campbell and two Chinese. The chief engineer died after reaching the hospital.

GERMAN RAILWAY STRIKE THREATENED

Wetmar, April 7.—Immediately after announcement was made that Polish troops would cross Germany railway men presented new demands to the government, threatening a general strike on April 10 if their demands were not granted.

Newspapers urge that the government must make the strike impossible, since the Entente Powers have declared that if transportation is delayed or made difficult they will insist on landing Polish troops at Danzig.

"A strike would be a crime against the entire nation," says the newspaper, "and the government must take the strictest measures to protect it."

New Bankruptcy Bill Would Give Uniformity

Provide Against Preferences Between Creditors and Give Advantage to Honest Man

(Toronto Globe.) Canadian commercial interests will be much interested in the Bankruptcy Bill recently introduced in the House of Commons a few days ago by Hon. Hugh Guthrie, solicitor-general. This is a more perfect copy of the measure before parliament last session, which was discussed for some time by a special committee. In the interval changes and amendments have been proposed, and Mr. Guthrie informed the House that before the bill is passed he will welcome further suggestions and improvements from the non-lawyers. In moving the second reading Mr. Guthrie pointed out that Canada and China are about the only countries in the world now without bankruptcy laws. Great Britain has one, and so has every other British Dominion. There was one in Canada between 1875 and 1880, but the machinery was too cumbersome, delays were tedious, and the administration of the act expensive, so that it fell into disfavor and was repealed in 1880. Now a Federal Bill.
