

## SWEESTAKES AT DOG SHOW WON BY MASTER BUTCHER

Toronto Entry is Best Shown—  
Haymarket Chatter Best Dog  
Bred by Member of Club

One of the most successful dog shows ever held by the New Brunswick Kennel Club was brought to a close last evening with the presentation of the cups by Commissioner McLellan to the owners of the winning dogs in the different classes.

C. H. Davis, of New York, who came at the invitation of the club to judge the show, was presented a silver cigarette case as a souvenir of the occasion in recognition of his valuable services. Mr. McLellan tendered him a vote of thanks on behalf of the club and complimented him on the satisfactory service he had rendered. The commissioner also spoke very highly of the untiring efforts of W. H. Mackay, president of the club, for which the success of the show was mainly responsible.

Mr. Davis, speaking of the local show in comparison with the upper Canadian dog shows, said it compared very favorably and that the class of local dogs were away above par except that their ring manners are not what they might be, and for that reason they did not show off as well as they otherwise would. He said the cocker spaniels in the show were the best quality dogs as a class with the collies a close second. He also spoke highly of the bull terriers.

The trophy presented by the late Governor Ganong for the best dog or bitch bred by a member of the club, which was won last year by W. W. Laskey with Pickled Peaches, was taken this year by Haymarket Chatter, owned by C. Phyllis McCaffrey.

The president's prize for the best dog in the show was won by J. J. Kent, of Toronto, president of the Canadian Kennel Club, with Master Butcher, who also won Commissioner McLellan's trophy cup.
