The yellow shades are so fashionable this season that nothing better could be selected for this blouse than delicate lemon color trimmed with black and white silk.

Today's home dressmaking lesson shows one of the fashionable new waists for summer. It may be carried out most effectively in liberty satin, very pale yellow being especially pretty. The vest looks well in narrow black and white striped silk. The waist is built upon a fitting lining, which requires about a yard of 36-inch material.

For the waist proper about two yards of 36-inch satin will be sufficient, and this comes at \$1 a yard and upward. Three-quarters of a yard of striped silk will be required for the vest, or wide ribbon may be used instead. The sleeves may be long or short, and the neck is finished with a round turnover collar.

First fold the material; then place the pieces of the pattern with edges marked.

ed by triple "TT" perforations on a lengthwise fold of the material. These are the front and back yokes (P), the collars (B) and (D), respectively, and the applied back. The outer front (E) vest and cuffs, (C) and (J), are placed on a lengthwise thread of the goods. There are one or two ways in which the neck can be finished. For a V-shaped neck cut out the neck edges of underbody front and back on single small "o" perforations and follow this same rule in the case of the sleeve, if elbow length is desired.

If the lining is carefully put together it will not require any alteration. Face the front and back from neck edges to double "o" perforations. Now adjust the vest to position on the front of the waist; fit to see that it is smooth and even. Close under-arm seam as notched; then close the shoulder seam. Hem the front as notched; then sew on the standing collar if this is to be used instead of the low neck.

Now gather the front, at the upper edge where it is to be attached to the yoke; then gather the bottom and lower edges of back and long sleeve between double "TT" perforations. Sew front to yoke as notched; place the sleeves in position, according to notches; then sew in armholes. Close under-arm, sleeve and cuff seams as notched.

Tuck the sleeves, following markings, stitched 1/4 inch or less from folded edges; finish the neck—adding collar—and prepare to arrange on the lining. At the back there is an applied pleat, and this must be gathered and adjusted to the outer back as indicated. Put on the lining, fit again and finish. The buttons are added last of all, save the girdle.

### Hints for the Cook

**Prize Nut Loaf.**  
 One and a half cups milk, one cup sugar, one egg, three cups flour, three teaspoons baking powder, one cup walnuts (broken, not chopped), no shortening. Let rise about forty-five minutes. Bake forty minutes.

**Buns.**  
 One cup of sweet milk, half yeast cake, half cup of granulated sugar. Stir a batter and let rise over night. When light, add half cup sugar, one-eighth cup of shortening, flour to make like biscuit dough. Let rise again and when light work on the board and roll out. Cut into buns and let rise again. When light bake slowly. Flavor with lemon.

**Cream Chicken**  
 Put one pint of stock in saucepan. Add three tablespoons of flour that has been blended with a little cold milk. Set this sauce in pan in skillet of water and allow to cook for half an hour. When nearly ready to serve put in the chicken and heat. Slice three hard-boiled eggs and a little pimento and add just before serving. This may be served on pieces of dry toast or turned over baking powder biscuits.
