AFTER BOSTON'S FIRE.

HOW THE RUINS LOOKED TO-DAY—ALREADY THE DEBRIS BEING CLEARED UP.

Traces of Missing Persons Discovered by Searching Party This Morning and Further Search to be Made this Afternoon—Value's Insurance Agency Estimated Loss \$10,000,000.

Boston, Nov. 29.—The burned district today presents a scene of desolation. A portion of the fire department spent the entire night and this forenoon in searching the ruins of the big blocks, while a cordon of weary officers are still guarding the ruins.

Great crowds of people are flocking to see the ruins all day. The walls of some of the gutted buildings are in a very dangerous condition and the officers are contemplating ranging them to prevent accidents. Gangs of men have already begun to clear away the debris in some of the blocks. The wholesale and retail merchants made arrangements to occupy their stores at once and to resume business as soon as possible.

The wholesale and retail merchants of Boston, with a single exception, wiped out, but all the firms will resume business as soon as suitable quarters can be secured. This morning men searching ruins of the Brown, Durrill and Row buildings found in the ruins of the latter two buildings a quantity of goods, including clothes, hats, shoes, and other articles.

In the upper portions of Chalmers street, and in the rear of the Row buildings, a mass of damaged blankets and goods which had been thrown from the buildings by the fire, and which were piled up in the street, were being carried off by the police.

The police are busy in clearing up the ruins of the buildings, and in removing the debris. They are also busy in searching for missing persons, and in guarding the ruins.

It is estimated that the loss to the merchants of Boston is about \$10,000,000. The loss to the general public is much greater.

The fire in the long run as this demonstrates that so-called fire proof buildings are in a class which has since resulted fatally, occurred at the residence of Arthur Everett, West street, yesterday afternoon. Mrs. Keane, widow of the late W. H. A. Keane and mother-in-law of the late Dr. Keane, was in the kitchen when the fire broke out.

She was picked up in an unconscious condition by the firemen. She was taken to the hospital, but she died yesterday morning.

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HARVEY EXECUTED.

THE GULPH MURDERER HANGED THIS MORNING.
