WAR SUMMARY

(Toronto Globe.)

Gabriel Hanotaux, formerly Minis-
ter of Foreign Affairs in France, in
a review of the war situation, says
that the day is not far distant when
a fearful hand-to-hand battle will be
waged which will end trench warfare
on the western front. "On both sides,"
he asserts, "tremendous preparations
are being made for a gigantic battle."
M. Hanotaux believes that the Ger-
man heavy artillery is a factor in the
enemy's favor. It can not only pre-
pare a great attack, but it is daily
killing allied troops. The French
light guns are much more efficient
than the German, and Britain is now
beginning to provide an adequate
supply of large-calibre weapons and
high-explosive projectiles. In a field
campaign, where the lighter and more
mobile guns are all-important, the
Allies would have distinctly the best
of it in artillery.

The midnight French official re-
port tells of great mining activity in
the Argonne. No less than nine mines
were exploded on this part of the
front. The artillery duel was particu-
larly violent north of the Aisne.
The British report tells of the shell-
ing of Loos. The British artillery
replied effectively.

The Bulgars have come into touch
with the Allies on the Greek frontier.
A first skirmish took place on
Friday between a French patrol and
a Bulgar, who are reported to be
moving their camps closer to the
frontier.

The Germans have been accumu-
lating large quantities of Zeppelin
bombs during the period of enforced
inactivity because of the winter's
storms, and now that the great air-
ships are on the warpath again there
seems to be no lack of bombs. The
recent raid was not without its pen-
alties for the raiders. The Admiralty
announces that a fishing vessel re-
ports having seen a Zeppelin in the
North Sea in a sinking condition. A
curious incident of aerial warfare is
the sinking of a British collier at sea
and the drowning of thirteen men
by a bomb dropped from a Zeppelin.
The airship which caused much prop-
erty loss and some loss of life at Sa-
loniki tried it a second time, but
was forced to retreat because of a
heavy artillery fire. The Zeppelin be-
haved as if it had been hit.

Italy's command of the Adriatic is
by no means complete. It is report-
ed from Berlin that the Koenig Al-
bert, a former big North German
Lloyd liner, has been captured by an
Austrian submarine and destroyer
and towed into Cattaro. The Koenig
Albert was on her way to Italy with
300 Serbian refugees when captured
and flew the Italian flag. The bigger
vessels of the Italian navy are not
on patrol in the Adriatic, and the de-

Destroyers and small cruisers are doubt-
less acting as convoys for the trans-
ports carrying troops to Avlona. The
capture of the Koenig Albert will
cause the Italians to keep much closer
watch on Cattaro.

Since the war began the soldiers of
France have been allowed wide lat-
titude in the matter of hirsute adorn-
ment. Whiskers, moustaches, Imper-
ials and all other varieties of facial
trimmings were permitted. Most of
the men wore full beards. The idea
of the Frenchman as a foppish fel-
low, greatly concerned about his per-
sonal appearance, was effectively dis-
sipated by photos of the French army
taken in the trenches. The laissez
faire period in whiskers is at an end.
It has been found that the deadly
trench microbes thrive on hairy faces,
and orders have been issued to the
French troops to shave clean. Mous-
taches will have to go as well as
whiskers, and there is no exemption
for the aristocratic Imperial. With
the natural ingenuity of the race and
an ever-present supply of stubble,
the whiskers of two million French-
men should make a lot of cushions
for use in bulletins. But perhaps even-
ing that form the discarded whiskers
would still be dangerous.

From German sources comes an
admission that the Turks have been
badly beaten in heavy fighting south
Erzerum. Eighty wounded Turkish
officers and five thousand wounded
men have arrived at Trebizond. There
they are still far from effective hos-
pital accommodation for the destruc-
tion of Turkish shipping has cut off
Trebizond effectively from Constan-
tinople.

ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGE
MAKES DRINKERS FAT

Stoutness Resulting From Drinking
Does Not Necessarily Insure
Good Health.

Not all hard drinkers are fat, but
the tendency of alcoholics to obesity
is too marked to escape notice. A
well-known doctor says it is because

will oxidize a two-ounce quantity of
alcohol in 24 hours, and will do so
completely that no trace of alcohol
can be found in any excretory sub-
stance. This simply means that the
unnatural heat produced in the body
by the presence of the stimulant an-
swers, for the time being at least, for
what would otherwise be produced by
the expenditure of fats and carbo-
hydrates. These latter are the fuel
stored up by the body and normally
burned up in the production of neces-
sary bodily heat.

"When alcohol is consumed it fur-
nishes heat—though not a natural
heat—and this expenditure is saved.
The fat is therefore stored up in
the body unused, and corpulence is
the necessary result. This, of course,
is not a normal condition nor a pro-
per process. It becomes more unna-
tural with increasing use of alcohol."
