

Course of Study

Classical, Commercial and Preparatory.

Classical Course.

This Course principally imparted in French, comprises six years of study. Latin, Greek, History, High Mathematics, Literature, Rhetoric, Sciences, Philosophy, etc., are taught; all that is requisite to prepare young men for any profession, religious, ecclesiastical or liberal.

Bourget College has been affiliated to Laval University, Quebec, since 1884.

French and English Preparatory Course.

This course consists of three years' study and embraces the teaching of the English and French Grammars, Geography, History, Arithmetic, Reading, Drawing, etc.

The object of this course is to prepare boys for the "Classical Course" or the "Complete English Commercial Course."

Complete English Commercial Course.

(SOLELY TAUGHT IN ENGLISH)

The branches included in the "Complete English Commercial Course" (which is solely taught in the English language) are those which embrace a complete English education, which is necessary to prepare young men to occupy with honor, to their own advantage, the various positions upon which they may be called in after life, viz: Reading, Spelling, Geography, Grammar, Penmanship, Drawing, History, Correspondence, Mental and Practical Arithmetic, Algebra, Mensuration, Literature, Rhetoric, Composition, Book keeping, Business Training, Commercial Transactions, Business Customs, Commercial Law, Political Economy, Banking, Consignment, Brokerage, Commission, Exchange, Elocution, Etiquette, Department, Type Writing, Phonographic Shorthand, Telegraphy, etc.

It is intended for young men who seek to the best English education that is given without the study of Latin and Greek.
