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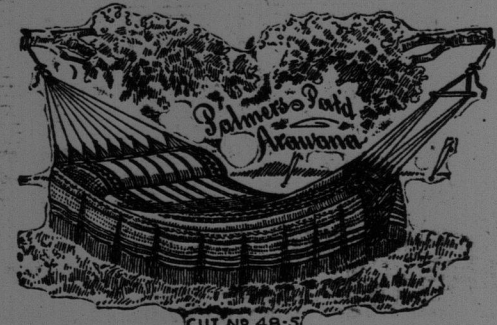

JAPANESE PAPERS TOLD TO SHUT UP

Must Not Print Anything of Sensational Nature An Attempt to Preserve the Present Friendly Feeling—War is Unlikely—The Trouble on the Coast.

LONDON, June 12.—"Such a contingency as an outbreak of war between the United States and Japan is regarded by educated Japanese as almost inconceivable," cables the correspondent of the Times at Tokyo.

DUNDONALD IS TALKING AGAIN

He Leaves the Army to Make Room for Baden-Powell And Claims That He Has Been Neglected at Home Because He Opposed Political Influences in Canada.

LONDON, June 12.—"I have retired because the British authorities offered me no employment since I was turned out of the Canadian militia for paying attention to political corruption in the appointment of officers," is the published explanation made by the Earl of Dundonald, whose retirement from the post of Lieutenant General led to the recent promotion of Major General Baden-Powell.
