STARR TROPHY GAMES

HAVE BEEN ARRANGED

Upper Canadian Will Likely Refuse—Crockett May Not be Able to Play—Pocket Book Stolen.

MONKTON, N. B., Feb. 24—Arrangements were completed today whereby the Halifax Crescents, the unbeaten champions of Nova Scotia, will play here Saturday and Sunday in a contest for possession of the Starr trophy, the emblematic of maritime hockey championship now held by the Moncton Victorias. A third game if necessary will be arranged later, as the Crescents claim it is impossible for some members of their team, on account of business connections, to stay away from Halifax longer than two days. It is possible that the Victorias will in these games be without the services of Joe Crockett, captain and crack rover of the team, who at the present time is confined to his bed by illness, which would irreparably weaken the local forward. In the event of this Kennedy of the Mohawks will play on the wings with Norman going to rover. The remainder of the local team will be Worthman, goal; McGrath, point; J. Brown, cover point; Gregory, centre, and Cushing, right wing. An effort will be made to get Robt. Meldrum, of Montreal, to referee, or some other capable upper province official. CHARGES AGAINST PERRY OF A SERIOUS NATURE

Chief Clerk is Holding a Rigid Investigation But Will Not Make the Evidence Public.

The enquiry into the charges brought against Policeman Ira Perry will be resumed by Chief Clerk this afternoon. Yesterday several witnesses were asked to make their statements, and although the investigation was not under oath, the developments as originally announced by the Star, were such as gave the affair a much more serious aspect. Chief Clerk will now conduct a thorough examination, and state what he will make public his findings at a later date.

It is said now that the report to the chief was made on Saturday last, February 20th, the day on which Perry was suspended. The charges arose out of an incident which happened on the night of October 28th, when the door of the Brayley Drug Co. was found open by the police. The fact that the door was found open appears as a police report under its proper date. The charges made against Perry have been known to at least several members of the force for some time, for they were discussed about the streets. It is said, weeks before the report, that Perry had been drinking.

At yesterday's hearing Charles Parren, Policemen Totton, Cavanaugh, Sullivan and Hughes were examined.

MORE EVIDENCE HEARD IN THE GOLDING CASE

There was but one drunk in the police court this morning. He was a bell boy from one of the hotels. He was remanded to jail and an endeavor is being made to find out where the youth got the liquor that made him drunk.

Louis Golding charged with stealing \$30 from a companion named Wilson was before the court again. Cornelius Chean told of being in the company of the defendant and of Golding buying drinks in five barrooms and giving small amounts of money away.

Deputy Chief Jenkins took the stand and reviewed the case from the start. D. Mullin, K. C., who represented the prisoner, asked for a discharge but it was not granted and the defendant was remanded to jail until Saturday.

BODY OF ANOTHER BABY FOUND TODAY

Was Mailed Up in a Box, in Walker's Slip.

Pieces of Iron Tied Around it to Make it Sink—Box Picked Up by Males of the Neptune.

The body of a newly born child was discovered in a box lying in the mud in Walker's slip this morning. The discovery was made by crew Laskey, mate of the tug Neptune. Mr. Laskey had noticed the box at low water yesterday, and when it was again uncovered by the receding tide this morning he decided to investigate it. Taking a pile pole he stepped on the tug which was lying at the end of Turbulle's wharf, and on to Jas. Knox's water boat, which was lying in the slip. From this point he was able to reach the box and by catching the rope tied around it with the hook of his pole, he dragged it on board. It was a small wooden box about ten inches long bearing the name of the Jas. Pender Co. and used originally for packing horse nails. A cover was loosely tacked on it and an iron bar which looked like a piece of grate bar was tied to it by rope yarn and a piece of hay wire.

When Mr. Laskey pried the box open he was horrified to find the remains of a child in it. He hastily covered it up and sent word to Sergt. Baxter. The sergeant, on learning the nature of the case, notified Coroner Berryman. The coroner came and unpacked the box, discovering the remains of a male child, evidently newly born, wrapped in an old piece of quilt and a roughly cut strip of factory cotton. A couple of small iron bars, similar to that attached to the outside, were found in the box, apparently placed there to make sure that it would sink.

A coroner was summoned and the coroner ordered the removal of the tiny body to the morgue.

Chief Clerk was notified and steps will be taken to discover the parents of the baby and the identity of the child. It is expected that the body of the remains. If the latter had thrown the box over only a little nearer the mouth of the slip it is likely that the box would never have been discovered.

Coroner Berryman is making enquiries regarding the matter, and says that in account of the condition of the remains he could not tell the age of the child or the cause of death, but his impression is that it was a still born child.
