AT EIGHT SHE TALKS 8 TONGUES



"CHERIE" WINIFRED SACKVILLE STONER.
Evansville, Ind., Oct. 12.—Little Miss Winifred Sackville Stoner, Jr., 8 years old, converses fluently in seven languages and in others to a limited extent. Little "Cherie," as she is called, is a product of the system of education advocated by John Stuart Mill and Prof. James of Harvard. Ever since her birth she has had the association of cultured minds and the classics. At three weeks her instruction began. When less than a year old she could talk, and at two she learned to write. By the time she was three the child could manipulate a typewriter and had begun to study the classics and Greek mythology. Mrs. Stoner, her mother, is at the head of the Woman's Esperanto League of America. "Cherie" has won a number of medals as an Esperanto expert. When four years of age the baby was given a diploma by Dr. Ramonho Russ as one of the best Esperanto linguists in the country. Winifred contributes frequently to newspapers and magazines. She won a silver medal from a child's magazine last fall for her clever verse. Her book of "Jingles" was printed last year. The prodigy is of English ancestry, being the granddaughter of Thomas Sackville, and the grandniece of the late Lord Lionel Sackville West, of whose estate her mother is the heir. Mrs. Stoner is the author of "Castles in Spain." The Stoners recently left Evansville for the west, where Col. Stoner is in charge of the United States Marine Hospital at Port Townsend, Wash.

HER REMEDY FOR DIVORCE

Any false condition under which we live today is the natural heritage from our barbarous ancestors, who ruled by brute force alone, recognizing neither moral nor intellectual rights. After the first step toward civilization was taken, and the woman had the privilege of refusing an offer of marriage, she also, incidentally, acquired the power of subtly attracting—or might say extracting—proposals from even unsuspecting men. With the right of rejection comes the right of choice. There are numberless men—would they but confess it—who cannot satisfactorily answer to themselves the question: "Why did I do it?" The woman attracted him to propose to her—until though he was—for

two reasons, both of which can be directly traced to the unequal, unreasoned and unnatural position of the sexes in the social and industrial world. First, women, as late as the last generation, have always been taught that they must marry at any cost. Second, they were taught that they must stay at home and wait until chosen.

Consequently the number of men upon whom they were privileged to practice their little arts and wiles were limited to the number of men who called upon them; and they were frequently reduced to a choice between evils. If the girl had but one beau, she needs must marry him, and she did. When woman has equal opportunities with man in the industrial world, she will have a larger circle from which to choose and will do so with more deliberation.

The girls of former generations, moreover, were taught that they must be dependent. The only position which a girl was allowed to consider was a life situation in which she was to be a dependent. And all this ever since knight-hood has been in flower. In the name of justice, let knight-hood wither and die. It has been in flower long enough without bearing fruit. Things have improved some along these lines, but absolute justice will not be done until women enter into their rightful place industrially and commercially, which can only be accomplished through the establishment of equal rights. Social conditions always adjust themselves to the industrial.

The most heinous crime that has ever been committed by man is that of giving his children an inferior or dishonest mother, and good but unthinking men have been doing that since the days of Adam, for the sake of a pretty face.

My assertion that women should make it easy for a man to propose is merely a statement of what she has been doing for centuries. But now that she is more capable of reflection and her opportunities are broadening, let her make it easy for the right man, i. e., the man who is her equal in all respects, and who does not consider that he is privileged to indulge in all kinds of vices and still aspire to be her mate. It is time that the sign "For Women and Children Only" should be removed from the ten commandments. The rule of quoted that opposites attract if true, must refer to physical features. Only those equal in mind and character can spend a happy lifetime together.

There is a crying need for uniform laws on marriage and divorce. No good is accomplished by our numerous and contradictory laws. Missouri, for instance, tries to take care of her future citizens by forbidding certain marriages. All that her laws accomplish, however, is to deprive a Missouri minister of a fee, and help the railroads. Missouri is so to Kentucky, marry and return home and the citizens of Missouri have their degenerate offspring to support. There should be stringent uniform laws forbidding the marriage of criminals, persons liable to transmit disease, persons within certain degrees of consanguinity and those under the age of full mental development. Given these and the divorce evil will reduce itself to a minimum.
