PROHIBITION ISSUE STIRS MAINE TALK

After Twenty-seven Years the Question of Wet or Dry is to be Fought at the Polls in September. Bangor, Me., July 17.—After 27 years experience with constitutional prohibition of the liquor traffic, Maine on Sept. 11 will hold a special election to determine whether the people wish to retain prohibition as a part of the organic law of the state or to cast it aside as a proven failure and an obstacle in the pathway of reform. While the prohibition men are confidently predicting a sweeping victory they are plainly worried as to the outcome of the Women's Christian Temperance Union, led by Mrs. L. M. Stevens, of Portland, national president, and many other organizations including church and Sunday school societies, are putting forth their earnest exertions to insure the retention of the famous fifth amendment, which was adopted by vote of the people in September, 1845. As a matter of fact, the issue is in doubt. Considering the fact that Maine experienced a political earthquake last fall, electing a Democratic governor and legislature largely upon the liquor issue, it is pointed out that the party leaders in the most earnest expression of anti-prohibition sentiment this autumn, but so many considerations will govern the voters and the party leaders that it is difficult to estimate the forces for and against the repeal of the constitutional amendment. The Republicans have generally come to recognize the fact that it was their allegiance, sincere or hypocritical, to prohibition for half a century that gradually weakened the party, and finally, in 1910, lost them the state, and that the Republican party councils who believe that a stand for liquor law reform would regain for the party all the ground that has been lost, but it is feared that they are too late. To accomplish such a feat would require the entire reconstruction of the party, for to abandon prohibition would be to part company with the great bulk of the rural vote that has been cast for the Republican ticket with religious regularity these many years and that has made possible the long, unbroken string of Republican victories from 1880 to 1910, when the deluge came. To offset the loss of the rural vote, or a large part of it, the Republicans would have to offer an attractive program to the men of the cities and towns.

May Strike at Governor. Should the leaders decide upon a license or local option policy there is no doubt that all—the city and town republicans who trained with the democrats last year would flock to their old standard, accompanied by a good many others, including most of the such class of the city and town democrats, and a considerable number of democrats, for it is no secret at all that Governor Plaisted's administration is decidedly unpopular with many of the democratic chieftains, including the members of the State Committee, whom the Governor has generally ignored in the matter of appointments to office. When William T. Cobb was Governor or he tried hard to enforce the prohibitory law, but, like all the others, he failed, the significant and interesting thing being that he had the honesty to admit it. Discussing the question in an address to a Portland club, Mr. Cobb said that he regarded prohibition as a football for politicians to play with, and he declared that if he had to choose between unenforced prohibition and free rum he would prefer the latter. But, whatever action the republican leaders may take in the matter, their party policy will not be made known until next June, and meanwhile the people, while rightly crediting the democrats with whatever progress has been made toward liquor law reform, will decide the fate of constitutional prohibition without regard to party lines. The democratic Legislature to express their sentiments upon the subject, a privilege that has been denied them by many republican Legislatures, and the 11th of September will tell the story.

Sharp Campaign Waged. It is likely that a large vote will be cast, for interest in the question is widespread and intense. Every sort of appeal is being made to prejudice sentiment and to self-interest, and as might be expected by any one at all familiar with the history of liquor agitation, many of the arguments are both for and against the retention of the constitutional amendment, are absurd and unbusinesslike. The prohibitionists have brought hosts of speakers from all parts of the country, and even from Europe, to plead for the retention of their policy.
