GOVERNMENT CANDIDATES HOLD ROUSING MEETINGS

Campaign in Kings County Goes With a Swing--Farmers will be Solid for Standard Bearers of Honest Administration--Mr. Hazen to Speak at Sussex.

Sussex, June 14.—Reports from all sections of Kings indicate a land slide for the government candidates—Hon. J. A. Murray, George B. Jones and Hedley V. Dickson. All three have been holding rousing meetings throughout the county and have everywhere received flattering receptions. Despite the fact that the farmers have been very busy getting in their crops, the halls in many places failed to accommodate the crowds who gathered to hear the story of the past four years of good government and progress of the Hazen-Fleming administration.

On all sides Messrs. Dickson, Jones and Murray have been assured of the earnest support of those who for years have been considered Liberal members of the Kings Municipal Council, who are not only voting for the government candidates, but are out in the open actively canvassing for the government, and this assures a considerable gain in the government vote and a corresponding decline in that of the opposition.

One great source of strength to the government ticket in Kings is the splendid manner in which the county representatives have looked after the public works of the constituency. In the river parishes tumble down dykes have been replaced by new, substantial and serviceable structures which are really capable of being used for the purpose for which they are intended.

All along the highways the same careful attention to the needs of the public is in evidence. Many costly iron bridges have superseded rotting and dilapidated wooden affairs, over which it was unsafe to pass. The smaller bridges have been rebuilt by hundreds and in many sections, the impassable under the old government, have had large sums of money expended on them. There is not a fair in Kings where the county is not able to see a well defined example near his home of the vast improvement made on the roads by the present administration, and scores of voters have, as a result, been won over to the outspoken support of the government representatives.

Improvement Marked.
While it has never been claimed that the roads in Kings are perfect, their vast improvement recently admitted by all save violent partisans. The people have not such short memories that they cannot recall that Kings, under the "Pugliese" combination, was a paradise for men who received road grants without proper vouchers and who then charged up insignificant repairs at enormous prices. Money has really been expended on the roads since 1908, and the fact that the voters realize this and remember the rotten conditions from March, 1908, makes campaigning for the government candidates an easy matter in Kings this year.

Then there is a most serious deficiency in the Liberal system. The old campaign fund of thousands which was formerly poured into the county by the Liberal henchmen at Fredericton and Ottawa is not in evidence. It was always the policy of the opposition forces to count on the weight of its "fund," but if reports are true the faithful have refused on this occasion to contribute to an already lost cause, and many former government adherents are making anxious enquiries for the persuasive arguments of the good old days. The loss of the intercolonial privileges, under which the Liberals were wont to move hundreds on free tickets has also had a marked effect on the enthusiasm of the rank and file of the party who cannot understand why there should not be as much in it as heretofore.

Double Handicap.
It will thus be seen that the Liberals are working under a double handicap, both of their own creation. By their absolute neglect of the public works of the county, they made possible a wonderful contrast under the present capable and honest administration, and by the excessive use of money secured through various grafting channels, they whet an appetite for corruption which they now find themselves unable to satisfy.

With these misfortunes hanging about their neck and the splendid record of Messrs. Murray and Jones and the recognized ability of Farmer Dickson to fight, it is only a question as to how large a majority Messrs. Pearson, Flewelling and Wetmore will be buried under. Some of the more fanciful leaders of the opposition claim that Dr. Pearson will displace Mr. Dickson, but reports from the lower end of the county indicate that the Pearson boom is a frost and that he will run away behind Flewelling and Wetmore in all parishes except those near his home. On the other hand Mr. Dickson has been promised a personal vote by scores of Liberals and his strength is assured.

One of the features of the campaign has been the open advocacy of the programme of the government by A. E. Pearson, a brother of Dr. Pearson. Mr. Pearson is a Sussex lawyer, and not only attended the government convention, but made a ringing speech at the Sussex committee rooms this week, in which he gave strong reasons for supporting the Fleming government.

During the next few days meetings will be held at many points in the county. On Monday night there will be a monster public meeting at the Opera House, Sussex, when addresses will be delivered by Hon. J. D. Hazen, Hon. J. A. Murray, George B. Jones and Hedley V. Dickson. The Hampton suburban will make a special trip from Sussex at the close of the meeting to accommodate those attending from points between Hampton and Sussex. The late Halifax train will carry those from points east of Sussex. Special excursion rates will be issued at all stations on the I. C. R. and a monster meeting is anticipated.

ST. JOHN WON GAME AGAINST FREDERICTON

The first of the two annual cricket matches between St. John and Fredericton was played on the Barrack Square on Saturday and resulted in a win for the local eleven by 6 runs on the first innings. The start was propitious, the first ball going to leg for 4 and the second following suit, for 2. Langford and Whalley, the bowlers, however, soon found their length and the score was kept down. Sturdee was responsible for 11 and was the only member of the team to reach double figures. The innings closed for 44.
