

# Tank Line Steamer Battered by Bullets

### The Herbert G. Wylie at Tampico Used as Bulwark by Rebels—Gunboats Fire Over Her—British Naval Officers Fired Upon.

Galveston, Texas, April 22.—Used as a bulwark by the rebel soldiers in their attack upon the city of Tampico and bearing numerous scars from the shells that were in the air, the tank line steamer *Herbert G. Wylie*, Captain W. E. ...

Protected by British Flag. The *Herbert G. Wylie* flies the British flag and shortly after the attack began and the extremely dangerous position of the tanker was seen, officers from the British cruiser *Hermion* were sent aboard.

Drifted in Steam. The officers in charge of the boat departing of the frigate finally cut themselves adrift from the docks and floated down the river, out of the danger zone.

As the tanker drifted down the stream she picked up from numerous barges and flat boats scores of women and children who had been driven from their homes and had sought safety on the river.

Other officers of the ship say that during the fighting and the nineteen days they were at Tampico, they witnessed many atrocities, some of which were almost beyond human belief.

Volunteers Die. Officers and men of the *Herbert G. Wylie* volunteered for Red Cross service after the battle.

Tampico Was Quiet. The ship left for Galveston on the 18th. At that time everything was quiet. Reports had reached the port of the possible action of the Americans and it was also generally understood that the battleships were coming.

## ASKS CONGRESS TO GIVE DR. COOK MEDAL FOR FINDING NORTH POLE

### Senator Poindexter Calls it Unreasonable to Suppose Cook Spent Winter in North Without Trying to Find It.

Washington, April 30.—The north pole discovery incident was revived in the senate today by Senator Poindexter, who introduced a joint resolution expressing the thanks of Congress to Dr. Cook for the discovery of the north pole on April 21, 1908, and authorizing the secretary of the navy to present him with a \$500 medal.

Senator Poindexter declared it was generally accepted Dr. Cook had reached a point of high latitude and contended that it was unreasonable to suppose he had spent the winter in the far north without attempting to reach the goal of his search, the north pole.
