The object of the Bill is to authorize the Municipality of the City and County of Saint John to issue Bonds to borrow money to the amount of \$15,000, and pay proceeds to Lancaster Highway Board of Permanent Sidewalks and to enable the Highway Board to borrow money from time to time for Highway purposes.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

The sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Land Office or Sub-Agent in the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Land Office (not Sub-Agent), on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence upon cultivation of the land; or live within five miles of his homestead and farm at least 90 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$1.00 per acre.

Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent also 90 acres; extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$5.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 90 acres and erect a house worth \$100.

The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

By order of the Council of the Municipality of the City and County of St. John a Bill will be presented for enactment at the next Session of the Legislature of the Province of New Brunswick, entitled "An Act to Amend an Act Respecting Extension of the Saint John Railway Company in the Parish of Gloucester."
