## THE BOARD OF TRADE TO SUSPEND MEETINGS DURING SUMMER MONTHS

At a meeting of the Council of the  
Board of Trade held yesterday the  
resolutions of Mayor Hayes, who re-  
tired because of civic duties, was re-  
spectfully accepted.

Another vacancy was announced  
through the removal of . . . B. Bam-  
ford, C. P. R. freight agent, to Toron-  
to.

A. J. Gray, of the I. C. R. freight  
department, was elected in Mr. Bam-  
ford's place.

The second vacancy will be filled  
later on.

A communication was read from the  
Newfoundland Board of Trade, com-  
plaining of the buying conditions  
which prevailed in the Barbados im-  
mass market, and suggesting that  
the Board of Trade of Montreal, Hal-  
ifax, Quebec, St. John and St. Johns  
get together on the subject. It was  
further recommended that molasses  
be purchased by weight rather than  
by gauging.

The secretary was authorized to  
secure the views of the local molasses  
importers and to communicate further  
with the Newfoundland Board of  
Trade.

A cable message was read from  
Mr. Frank Hatheway, stating that the  
Cunard steamship service between  
Bristol and Montreal would begin im-  
mediately. The matter was referred  
to the traffic committee.

A communication from the Quebec  
Board of Trade, asking for co-opera-  
tion in a movement  
building of a number of steel ships  
by the federal government, was sub-  
mitted. As the subject was already  
being considered by Sir George E.  
Poster, and as it presented some dif-  
ficulties that could not be overcome  
at this time, the communication was  
tabled for the present.

A letter from the commissioner of  
property of Toronto was read with  
respect to the conditions which pre-  
vailed at the civic abattoir, Toronto.  
The commissioner was thanked for  
the information.

It was decided to suspend sessions  
of the board until the first Monday in  
October.

The prepayment of freights on the  
steamers of the R. M. S. P. line formed  
the subject of complaint by some  
business houses. The complaints  
will be referred to the company.

Some other business of a minor  
character was considered.

Vice-president Wetmore presided in  
the absence of Wetmore.

## OPPOSED TO THE FAVORED NATION CLAUSE

French Committee of Cham-  
ber of Deputies Denounce  
Treaties which Contain it.

Paris, June 9.—The customs com-  
mittee of the chamber of deputies to-  
day drew up a resolution urging the  
denunciation by the government of  
all commercial treaties with foreign  
countries which contain a most favor-  
ed nation clause. In order, says the  
resolution, to give France complete  
liberty of economic action.

The committee asks that this ac-  
tion be taken without delay, and it  
delegated its president, Deputy  
Raville, to notify the minister of com-  
merce of the committee's desire.
