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

While his father and mother were in the city buying Christmas presents, Percy, the ten-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Moore, Gamett Settlement, was shot and killed by his little brother soon after noon on Wednesday. The boys were playing "hunter and moose," and Percy was killed when a Mank cartridge in a shot gun exploded near his face. His face was terribly mangled and he was killed almost instantly.

A thirteen-year-old sister, who was at the post office at the time, as soon as she learned of the tragedy, ran two miles to the Ben Lomond House at Loch as she learned of the tragedy, ran two miles to the Ben Lomond House at Loch Lomond, and from there the telephone was used to communicate the awful tidings to the parents in the city. They left town immediately, arriving at the grief-stricken home on Christmas eve, just about the time the little ones had expected to hang up their stockings for Santa Claus. Coroner Roberts, of this city, who was informed of the accident, gave permission for burial, and the body will be in-terred this afternoon.
