

### TIGERS SPLIT WITH AXE-MEN

The Dalhousie Tigers were defeated 10-6 in their first away game of the season last Wednesday by the Acadia Santamarians to a tune of 68-48 in Axemen at Wolfville. As a result of this game there is a a well-played tilt at the Dal gym. three-way tie for first place in the Intercollegiate Hockey League between Saint Mary's, Acadia and Dalhousie, who all have 1-1 records. Dal played a very clean game and there were no penal-called against them.
