

## The Waters and Baths.

The waters come under the classification of "Alkaline Saline." The springs are four in number, and are respectively known as the "Saline," "White Sulphur," "Gas," and the "Duncan," or "Strong Saline." The Saline is the liver water, and taken in the prescribed manner acts as a mild laxative, alterative and tonic. The White Sulphur is the kidney water—a diuretic—and acts also on the blood and skin, its purifying effects being most remarkable. The Gas is the great stomach water, and used in

dyspeptic and nervous disorders. The Duncan is a very powerful aperient, being as highly concentrated a saline as it is advisable to drink pure; all form most agreeable beverages.

The water for the baths is pumped from the springs and heated as required, and the baths comprise the usual varieties.
