WINNIPEG MARKET LETTER

Wheat.—Following the heavy liquidation in Chicago and Minneapolis, May 10, which brought a sharp decline last week, our wheat has declined considerably and is weak and dull. This decline may however, be traced to improved crop conditions over the United States, and to the fact that reading, dairy farmers, grainmen as well as shipping, have been more speculative the last week than for some months past, and the advantage has been with the buyers. It is to be noticed that while shipments by water from Port William and Port Arthur have been held in abeyance, about four and a half million bushels in wheat, stocks have increased only about one million and a half, going to about three-quarters of a million bushels in wheat, stocks have been increased only about one million bushels for some weeks past. World shipments continue quite heavy, especially from the Argentine and with over-opening of navigation ships reaching Great Britain in another fortnight, there should be no scarcity with them of wheat offerings. It may be noted that wheat is still above what it was a year ago, and the Argentine shipments are after all larger than ours had looked for. The decline has been more noticeable in the low grades, which have been hard to sell. Farmers holding grain in store at the present time, those who may think of shipping barley in the next few days might very well wait a few weeks.—Flea has had quite a decline this last week, but a little lighter in the Dutch May Option is for a few days keeping our May option, and we have the situation now of May flea being worth more than July flea. This will likely not continue. Prices are still very good however, and farmers can make no mistake in shipping out their holdings. Rejected and condemned flea are very dull, and the spreads have widened in the last day or two.

Oats.—Heavy liquidation in the United States markets, with indications of a further decline, is continuing available, all helped in having heavier declines in our oats, and the May has broken heavily at present at this time of the year. We expect oats to be a little lower yet. All of grade oats, especially those in United States terminals have had to be sold at heavy discounts, not fit for those having low grade oats, that the high grades have been held at such fancy prices lately, else the low grades would be exceedingly low prices. The decline in oats has helped to break the barley market. There is no more barley wanted at the present time, those who may think of shipping barley in the next few days might very well wait a few weeks.—Flea has had quite a decline this last week, but a little lighter in the Dutch May Option is for a few days keeping our May option, and we have the situation now of May flea being worth more than July flea. This will likely not continue. Prices are still very good however, and farmers can make no mistake in shipping out their holdings. Rejected and condemned flea are very dull, and the spreads have widened in the last day or two.
