Refolved, That the bill be committed to a committee of the whole House.

On motion of Mr. Haliburton, ordered, that Mr. Haliburton, Mr. Dimock, Mr. Robie, Mr. Lawfon, and Mr. James, be a committee to examine into the accounts of Michael Wallace, Efqr. John Merrick, and others, relative to the New Government Houfe (and which were prefented to this Houfe on the 11th and 19th January laft) and report thereon to the Houfe.

Mr. Ritchie delivered to the House an amended return from the Sheriff of the County of Annapolis, to the writ for electing one member for the faid county, together with the special facts attending the execution of the faid writ, agreeably to the order of this House, of the 6th June last.

A petition of John H. Fliegher, weigher and gauger, for the port of Halifax, was prefented by Mr. Robie, and read, praying for an augmentation to his falary in confequence of the increase of duty in faid office.

A petition of Ebenezer Wheaton, was prefented by Mr. Crane, and read, praying for fome relief in confequence of the lofs of the use of his right arm by being bled, when doing duty in the embodied militia last winter at Halifax.

Ordered, That the faid petitions do lie on the table.

On motion, *refolved*, that this Houfe will, on Monday the 12th inftant, take into sonfideration the feveral private petitions now before the Houfe.

Then the House adjourned until to-morrow, at eleven of the clock.

Mr. Pyke, purfuant to leave given, prefented a petition of George Wright, clerk mafter of the Public Grammar School in the town of Halifax, and the fame was read, fetting forth, that in the year 1789, he refided at New-York, and enjoyed a falary of 500l for two fituations which he then held, one as mafter of a private fchool, the other as paffor to a numerous congregation in the town of Brooklyn; that, in December in the above year, he was invited by the then Truffees of the Halifax Grammar School, Henry Newton, Thomas Cochran, John Newton, and Richard John Uniacke, Efgrs. to come to Halifax, and take charge of faid fchool, affuring him 100l, per annum for himfelf, and 50l for an ufher, the fame being fecured to him by a law of the Province; that he placed confidence in the aforefaid affurance—quit his fituations in New-York aforefaid, and came to the Province, took charge of the fchool, and received the aforefaid falaries from 1789 to the end of the laft Seffion of General Affembly; that fince that period the faid falaries have not been included

in
