The miner cannot lift earth and rock with it over breast high, and that with considerable effort, as compared with a throw of eight to nine feet made by the American miner's shovel. The Russian operators, however, very generally will be found to prefer own home-made tools, claiming them to be the cheaper for them, particularly because the native tree-limb handles are so cheap and can so easily be replaced when broken. It is largely through such ideas of cheapness and the use of such inferior tools that the Russian mining is so costly, though Russian miners' day wages are ver low. It is a condition that has no always been given the determining weight in considering the mining o foreign investment of foreign capits in Siberian mines that it should have When the better tools are substitute and the workmen made skilled in their use, the latter invariably have to b paid higher wages, so that in the end it is found that the cost of the work to the mine operator is not diminished a great deal.



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
