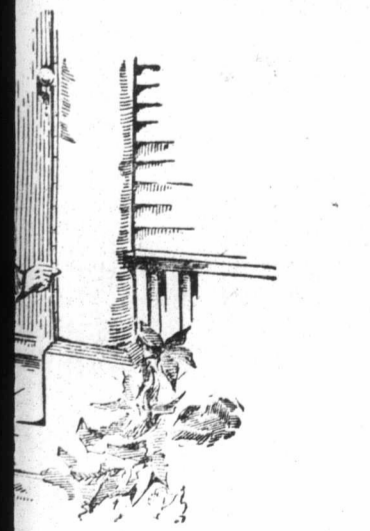

HACKED THEM TO DEATH AND BURNED MANY ALIVE

Horrifying Story of Bulgarian Massacre is Confirmed by Report of Consul General - Town of 30,000 is Completely Wiped Out.

[Canadian Press Despatch] SAIKI, July 16.—Full confirmation of the reported burning of the town of Zeres by the Bulgarian troops and of crucifixion to death or burning of many of the inhabitants was sent to the Austro-Hungarian Government by Consul-General Kral of Saloniki.

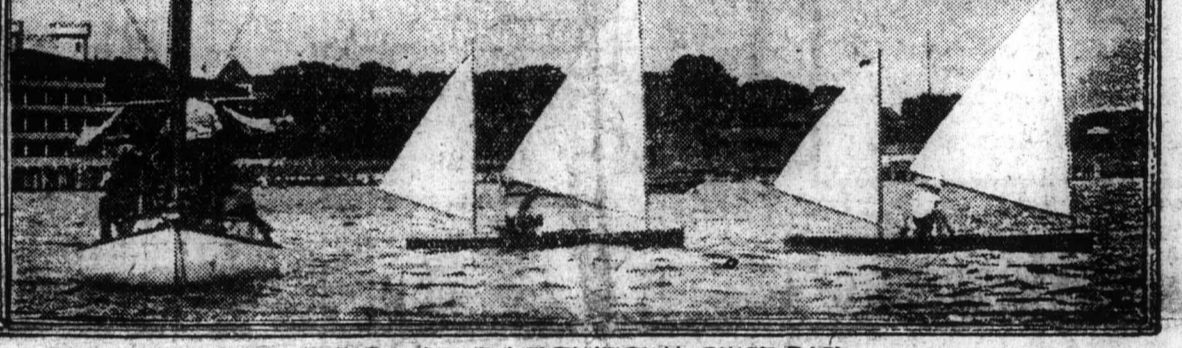

JAPANESE GIVEN VERY SHORT NOTICE TO LEAVE THE STATE

Gang of Construction Men Threaten to Use Rope on Party of Jap Laborers in Colorado—Led Them Two Miles Out of Town After Capture.

[Canadian Press Despatch] STEAMBOAT SPRINGS, Colo., July 16.—A construction gang working on the extension of the Denver and Salt Lake Railroad yesterday, attempted to drive from the grading camp a party of Japanese laborers, who were brought here last Tuesday.

Early yesterday morning a gang went to the Japanese camp, three of them impersonating officers for the purpose of gaining an entrance into the camp. As soon as the doors were opened the gang of men rushed into the camp with ropes and revolvers and ordered the Japanese to dress, giving them notice that they must cease work on the railroad grade and leave this part of the country.
