How Infantry Gallantly Saved in Front of Tr

Ottawa, July 21.—The ventures of the 1st Air in France are graphically told from the front line by Col. E. W. B. Morrison, Part of the Northern France, June 24th. This brigade is still in a condition to be a condition of the front line. The latest news from having this brigade steadily within rifle range, they have begun to Jerry in lieu of machine guns in front of trench. On the 15th of June they were in the front trench on the gun wheels and was bound with rags to click of the chains being the guns were put in belt most rapidly, 80 yards from enemy's machine gun. Then our infantry assaulted the trench, but my gun was unprotected by any para target for the enemy at the trench. The guns had been made of steel, but a German shell wrecked the gun and killed the gunner. One of the lingers also was killed. ONLY ONE-FIFTH R. Of the Canadian regiment assaulted at this point and one-fifth of the men were left alive. Major Smith was the farthest forward and finally brought back his men for an hour's rest. They were practically wiped out. The assault was along three divisions, but every result was the same, except that the regiment was practically wiped out. Officers only one return of machine gun, an infantry hand-bomb and eight exp of a power never before in warfare. For instance, ally-made tool armor put ward guns resisted rifle as point-blank range as the men had been shot through them as if they were paper. We could not extricate that night because of dead and wounded in trenches. At dawn I went see what could be done. Yeggy. One gun was smashed, but the other, "O" was standing up in full. Germans as the mist began left there it was certain to be pieces as soon as artillery could see it. I on the infantry for a word to drag it under cover of a HEROIC EFFORT. The poor fellows had all night without sleep a ter of dead and wounded pulled them together out of the trench stiff and heavy-eyed with strain and fatigue. I explained we heartened and how to take an infantryman regards it was some strange wild "it's gone off?" queried anxiously. Assured on this rushed into the open and the gun. Immediately my man, who had evidently been standing up in full view, opened rifle fire. TASK SEEMINGLY H. We got the gun on the slope, when somebody tall, which lifted up into following the muzzle to ground, and there it stuck.
