Chairman Ald. Geo., W. Cowan, of the Industrial Committee, has been doing a little industrial work on his own hook of late. He has been in communication with an eastern firm in the iron industry and has persuaded them that Chatham will be an excellent spot to locate. The capital of the company will be from \$150,000 to \$200,000 and will the first year erect buildings 240 by 60 feet, one store of concrete and steel, and will employ from 40 to 50 hands, mostly skilled mechanics. It is more copied and more fiercely attacked than any other book and yet it comes out every time unscathed and all th more read. It is read every day in Christian homes. It is the best comion to missionaries to foreign lands. It cheers the heart. King Edward the Seventh, King of the world's greatest empire, was sworn o his duties on the Bible, emid the most pompous and pageant cere-

monies the world has ever seen.
"But," continued Mr. Steward, "it is not here for me to make a eulogy on the Bible, it is like an attempt on the Bille, it is the an attempt to paint the lift. What I wish to do is to bring before you reasons why we should search the scriptures. It was Jesus who used the words search the scriptures, and he was talking to the Jews at the time. Who would not believe He was the Messiah? He showed them the testimony of John who, He said, was their great-John who, He said, was their greatest prophet and had said He was the Messiah. Jesus also pointed out his own works and what God had said, 'This is my beloved Son in whom I am well pleased.' Lastly he told them to search their own scrip-

There are other books so-called Bibles, and a't the Chicago World's Exposition there was a carnival of religions, most all of them had Bibles of their own which were altogether different from our Bible. In every case of the other Bibles man was seeking after God, while in ours God is seeking after man. After Adam sinned God asked Adam 'Where art Thou.' God is asking now for us all |

The Bible is made up of 66 little books written by 40 different authors, and it took from 1400 to 1500 years to complete the book. The writers consist of kings and peasants, learned and unlearned, poets and humble men. Every book of the 39 of the Old Testament speaks of

In continuing Mr. Steward took the different books of the Old Testament, explaining in what connection they mentioned Jesus Christ. He spoke of the Bible as more pre-cious than gold, and next to it, "Pilgrim's Progress," Bunyon's great book, had done the most good.

In conclusion he spoke of how Sir Walter Scott had asked for it on his death bed and what a great help it was at all times of trouble. The informal tea at the church to-night is free to all who wish to
