IT IS GROWING WORSE

More Operatives go Out at Valley field, Quebec—Four Arrests.

Valleyfield, Quebec, Oct. 27.—There are now 2,000 men out on strike in Valleyfield. Yesterday morning about 600 operatives in the mills of the Montreal Cotton Co. quit work, and in the afternoon all the other operatives went out. This greatly complicates the situation, and fears are entertained that serious trouble may take place. The arrests so far number four. At noon Napoleon Trudeau created a disturbance on the bridge, near the mills, and was ordered by Sgt. Moore, who was in charge of the squad of the Victoria Rifles, to move on. The man refused and attempted to assault Sgt. Moore. In the scuffle Trudeau was wounded in the side with a bayonet.

"A YELLOW PERIL."

Sir Richard Hart's Opinion of the Boxers' movement.

London, Oct. 27.—Sir Robert Hart, Director-General of the Chinese Imperial Maritime Customs, in an article in the November number of the Fortnightly Review, takes a pessimistic view of the Chinese situation. He frankly declares his opinion to be that the Boxer movement is national and patriotic, has taken hold of the Chinese imagination and will spread like wildfire throughout the length and breadth of the empire. "There is not the slightest doubt," he says, "that fifty years hence there will be millions of Boxers at the call of the Chinese government." Discussing the alternative courses open to the powers, Sir Robert sees a very real "yellow peril" ahead, and no hope of a permanent solution.

MAC'S FURIOUS ATTACK

Another Liberal Ex-M. P. Violently Assaults the Laurier Government--

Political Notes.

Nanaimo, B. C., Oct. 27.—W. W. B. MacInnes, last night, at a big meeting at the Extension coal mines, near here, furiously attacked the Laurier Government. He declared that it had been false to every promise. It appointed an Oriental commission as a blind to allay the agitation in the west, which is becoming dangerous, although the Imperial Government advised the Laurier Government to adopt the Natal Act in reference to the Chinese. Laurier would not do this, because the C. P. R. would lose a million and a half from carrying Chinese and Japanese to British Columbia. He said the Conservative Government had drained British Columbia of eight hundred thousand dollars, but this robber Government of Laurier's had drained it of upwards of sixteen hundred thousand dollars. Their legislation regarding British Columbia was a complete farce, only intended to appease the clamors of the people here in regard to the Enquiry, MacInnes said that not one of them was honest—all humbugs appointed to throw dirt in the eyes of Yukoners and gain time. No attempt at rectifying the abominable abuse rampant there. Everybody was taken completely by surprise by MacInnes' assault on the Liberal Government. Many believe he is more than half over to the Conservative side.

QUEBEC IS ALL RIGHT.

Conservatives Tolerably Certain of Making Large Gains.

From strictly reliable sources comes most encouraging news of Conservative success in the Province of Quebec. The indications are that Port Neuf, which returned Sir Henri Joly in 1896, by the narrow majority of 30, will be represented in the next parliament by Mr. Lawrence Stafford, of Quebec, who was Sir Henri's opponent at the last general election. Because he voted with Sir Charles Tupper in the last session of 1896, Mr. Arthur Delisle, the late sitting member, has been turned down and Mr. S. Delisle, a Liberal of the Pacaud stripe, was given the party nomination. A large section of the Liberals is, however, in sympathy with the ex-M. P., and Mr. Arthur Delisle now announces his intention to run as an independent Liberal. But whether he does or not the Conservatives are confident of being able to carry the seat.

In Levis Mr. Dumouther, the Conservative candidate, a man with a most honorable record, and an able and eloquent speaker, is making great headway against Mr. Demers, the Liberal candidate, who is a veritable stick. Further advice are that Montmagny, Kamouraska, Temiscouata, Rimouski, and Bonaventure will elect opposition candidates, and that the seats which knew Mr. H. G. Carroll, Mr. C. A. Gauvreau and Dr. J. A. Ross will know them no more. It is also under-

stood that Mr. Charles Marcell arrived too late in the county of Bonaventure to affect Mr. Belanger's chances of election.

In Dorchester there are two Liberals running against Mr. J. B. Morin, ex-M. P. But the best men in the county are rallying around Mayor Morin's standard.

In L'Assomption the Liberal candidate is Mr. Charlemagne Laurier, brother of the premier, whose only cry is "my brother has sent me forth." Notwithstanding this shibboleth the Conservative candidate, Mr. Ethier, is rallying independent as well as Conservative voters to his support at a rate that makes his election look easy.

A PATRON IN WEST ELGIN.

The Conservatives Will Also Give Him Their Support.

West Lorne, Oct. 27.—The Patrons of Industry met in convention here yesterday to select a candidate to contest the West Riding of Elgin against Mr. McGugan, the Liberal candidate, Jabel Robinson, of Middlemarch, was the unanimous choice. Speeches were made by the candidate, Dr. Brock Thomas Montague and others. It is understood that the Conservatives will meet at Rodney to-day and endorse Mr. Robinson's candidature.

IT FLOPS AGAIN

La Progress, of Windsor, Has been Brought Into Line.

The decided reversal of opinion expressed in La Progress, Windsor, this week is causing comment on all sides. It printed a scathing editorial prior to the Liberal convention against Mr. Gregory, and an appeal was made that a French candidate be nominated. Sutherland landed the nomination in spite of the protests of the French paper.

At this late stage La Progress announced yesterday in the largest black face type in the office: "Voter pour R. F. Sutherland." "Vote for R. F. Sutherland." In an editorial column the same is liberally spread on Sutherland.

The article intimates that several French voters are disconcerted and thinks that the time has about come when patience should cease to be a virtue, but the editor requests his compatriots to be patient and again support an English candidate. A few extracts are as follows: "Shall we avenge an accumulation of injuries by sacrificing Mr. Sutherland, yes or no? We will give reasons which influence us to say 'no.' Mr. Sutherland had made a compact with the French-Canadians. Shall we abandon him? Honor itself commands every French-Canadian to support Mr. Sutherland. Once elected, if he betrays the confidence which is reposed in him we shall be ready to denounce him. We have confidence in

CLANCY WILL WIN.

Warden Davidson Thinks There is no Doubt about it.

"James Clancy" will represent the Bonaventure constituency in our next Dominion Parliament. And he will go back with a bigger majority than ever.

Such was the confident prediction of County Warden John Davidson, of Thameville, to the Planet this morning, when asked concerning political prospects in his constituency.

"Mr. Clancy," he continued, "is universally honored and esteemed even by his opponents, while his friends are most enthusiastically energetic on his behalf. Only the other day I was talking to a county representative, one of the strongest life-long Liberals I ever knew, and he expressed his opinion that Mr. Clancy would win. 'Why, the personality of the man would do it alone,' he declared. 'In a lengthy political career and in an extended personal intercourse I have never known him to do anything but a noble act or trait in the man. It is this that convinces me we cannot better our representative, who has the interests of his constituents and country at heart.'

"Such comments as that," said Warden Davidson, "show the trend of public opinion and show it well. In our own district I believe Mr. Clancy will make substantial gains and the same will, I believe, hold good throughout the entire riding."

HELD THEIR OWN.

Boers Failed to Capture Jacobsdal as Reported.

Formal Annexation Ceremonies of the Transvaal Takes Place—Steyn's New Capital.

London, Oct. 27.—It now appears that Jacobsdal was not captured by the Boers. Advice received from Cape Town shortly after midnight says: "Later news from Jacobsdal shows that 200 Boers successfully attacked the garrison. The Highlanders had 14 killed and 20 wounded." When the first report was received, it was regarded in London as a curious coincidence that the report of the capture of Jacobsdal by the Boers should be received concurrently with the expected arrival of news from South Africa of the City Imperial Volunteers, as Jacobsdal was the scene of the latter's first fight. The town was captured from the Boers by the volunteers on Feb. 15.

A Durban despatch says: "The Boers are raiding in the northern part of Natal. They have burned the railway station at Waasbank and blown up a culvert."

FORMALLY ANNEXED.

Pretoria, Oct. 26.—The Transvaal was yesterday proclaimed a part of the British Empire, the proclamation being attended with impressive ceremonies. The royal standard was hoisted in the main square of the city, the Grenadiers presented arms, massed bands played the national anthem, Sir Alfred Miller read the proclamation, and troops representing Great Britain and her colonies marched past.

TRAIN CUT OFF.
Cape Town, Oct. 27.—Hans Botha has cut off a train, with a reconnoitering party of the Highland Brigade, between Heidelberg and Greylingstad, in the Transvaal colony, tearing up the rails in front and behind the train. In the fight which followed two captains and eight men were wounded and all were captured.

ANEW CAPITAL.
Maseru, Basutoland, Oct. 27.—It is reported here that former President Steyn and a number of the executive council are at Fouriesburg, south of Bethlehem, and that he has declared Fouriesburg to be the "capital" of the Orange Free State. Mr. Steyn has ordered Krieger, a member of the late Volksraad, to be tried on the charge of high treason.
