THE IRON INDUSTRY.

The manufacture of iron and steel is probably of the greatest national importance of any industry in a country where the natural facilities and raw material abound suitable to its production.

In the United States of America, which now ranks second in the world's production of steel and iron, it was found necessary to protect the home industry by protective legislation, and consequently we find that large inducements were offered and subsidies granted to the building of railways, but with provision that the rails and all the other iron used in their construction and equipment should be of American manufacture.

In natural facilities for the manufacture of iron and steel and in the abundance of its ore, Canada stands second to no country in the world, and for its many other industries it holds no mean position.
