A Book on the Army.—"General Booth: The Family and the Salvation Army, showing its Rise, Progress and Moral and Spiritual Decline," by S. H. Hodges, LL. B., late Major in the Army, and formerly Private Secretary to General Booth, is an octavo pamphlet of 77 pages, received at this office. The book throws a good deal of light upon the history of the Booths and the inner workings of the Army, but that the author proves that the leaders of the Army are not morally and spiritually what they should be is by no means clear. His hobby seems to be the doctrine of Holiness, which he claims is not professed by Gen. Booth and his family. He argues that expediency has been the rule in the government of the Army, not principle. All his instances go to show that the grievances complained of have arisen from the General holding all power in the hands of the family and trusted officers, and it is only a matter of opinion whether or not this is the wivest plan, in view of the new material which he raised, and had to use in the work. That there has been apparent harshness, despotism, and other faults is no doubt true, but when one considers the immense benefit done by the Army to the neglected masses of England, it is open to question whether any other system of machinery, imperfect and hard though this may appear to be, would have so "successfully accomplished such a great work."
