COLDWELL GETS HIS Continued from page 1 which excited a hostile demonstration was to the effect that the Orangemen of Canada had made a great mistake in voting against Sir Charles Tupper in 1896. Mr. Coldwell in dealing with the attempts to induce the Winnipeg school board to take over the Roman Catholic schools, read extracts from the petition sent to the school board by the Roman Catholic ratepayers and, as well, the letter sent the same body by the legislation committee of the orange grand lodge. He repeated the argument advanced by him at Brandon, that these two bodies were in agreement as to the method by which the parochial schools should be taken over.

Only Read Part At this point James Willoughby, grandmaster of the Orange order intervened. He said that Mr. Coldwell was only quoting a portion of the Roman Catholic petition and demanded that he read the preamble as well.

This the minister warmly refused to do. "That," he said, "is the contention of your grit school board."

"If the school board's action in this matter," Mr. Willoughby retorted, "constituted them Orits then every member in this room ought to be a grit."

Catholic Teachers This was greeted by a roar of applause which visibly disturbed the ministers. The discussion proceeded and under the pressure of persistent questioning, Mr. Coldwell acknowledged that his amendments to the Manitoba School Act made it possible for the school board to take over the Roman Catholic schools in the city of Winnipeg and continue to operate them as they are at present; and that previous to passing of these amendments it would be contrary to the public school law for the Winnipeg school board to have done this. He further admitted that if the school board of Winnipeg did take over the Roman Catholic schools his amendments would compel the hiring of Roman Catholic teachers to teach in these schools and none others would be employed.

Their Demands Mr. Willoughby called up on the minister of education to repeal his amendments to the school act passed last session; abolish the bilingual system of schools; to enact a compulsory school attendance law, and have one public school system for all classes and creeds, without any restriction as to teachers, save that

each teacher should be in possession of the necessary qualifications as laid down by the government.

If the government would do this, Mr. Willoughby pledged them the support of 80 per cent of the members of the Orange association. He would himself do all in his power to secure the return of the government. "We don't want you," replied the minister of education pointedly. Hon. George Lawrence, minister of agriculture, who followed tried to rattle with the situation with an impassioned "Old flag" deliverance in which he let it be understood that in some mysterious manner, the fate of the Empire was dependent upon the continued support by the Orangemen of the Roblin government. The audience, however, was in no mood for a deliverance of this kind.
