Friday, the 29th, at Black Caves at 8 p. m. at Jules LeBlanc's; at 6 o'clock the same night at William McDerm's.
Saturday, the 30th, at St. Apollone. Sunday, the 31st after Mass at Carleton; and after vespers at Bonaventure.

After Nomination Day if there is any election Messrs. Marcell, Bujaud and Kelly will speak in every parish of the county. It is not surprising that Mr. Mousseau who had been chosen as the Opposition candidate backed down with such a formidable opposition against him. It is admitted by all that Mr. Mousseau would have lost his deposit, and Liberals and Conservatives alike are convinced that if Dr. Verge remains in the field he will certainly meet with a similar fate. The Conservatives of the county of any standing have all advised him to remain at home as Messrs. Marcell and Kelly have done more for the County of Bonaventure than any two men before them and they have the people at their back.

GRAND CASAPEDIA, Friday.—Seven large and enthusiastic meetings were held in Bonaventure County yesterday.
