

ABOUT THE H., O. & B. ROAD.
The Company Securing Right of Way for the Extension.

Yesterday afternoon a meeting of the shareholders of the Hamilton, Grimsby & Beamsville Electric Railway was held at the company's offices. President Lester was in the chair and the attendance was large. A lengthy discussion took place on the proposed extension of the road to Grimsby Park and Beamsville but nothing definite could be done owing to the meeting not having

right-of-way of laws passed by the municipalities interested. It was pointed out that the Councils of Grimsby Village, North Grimsby and Lincoln County had passed by-laws favorable to the road. The shareholders were unanimously of the opinion that nothing could be done towards constructing the five mile extension unless the city turned over the \$20,000 worth of bonds, representing the company's bonus.

Some rumors relative to ex-Supt. Nelles, whose proposed reinstatement is still a sore point with some of the stock-holders, were refuted by the

friends but no steps were taken towards reinstating him.

Last evening Messrs. Lester, Myles, Hoodless, Martin and Wright went down to Beamsville and succeeded in getting the Council there to pass a by-law giving the company free right of way through this village. The same deputation will meet the Council of Clinton Township at Beamsville on Monday afternoon and endeavor to get the final right of way by-law passed.
