

The place is Acarabled Creek, between the Barama and Cuyuni rivers. Until seven years ago the country thereabouts was covered with primeval forest. Farming grants were opened out, and are now well scattered along the banks of the Barama River, which is not to be confounded with the Barima. The territory is to the eastward of the provisional line, within which, according to bord Salisbury, no question of title can be admitted. Gold was discovered in the region, and the metal has already been taken to Georgetown in surprising quantities. Mr. Thurn still administers the territory, with the assistance of a staff, which includes a magistrate, physicians, collector of taxes, police and mine officers. Three public hespitals have been erected at Morahaua. Arakuka and Baramanny. A weekly steamer runs to Georgetown, and steam launches ply on both the Barama and Barima Rivers.
