Hon. Mr. Veniot introduced "An Act relating to H'shways". By it the rooks are to be divided into trunk and branch roads; branch road supervisors are to be elected by district ratepayers; statute labor will be optional with such ratepayers; and also optional on trunk roads; the property road tax will be 25 cents per \$100 instead of 20, and the poll tax \$2.00 instead of \$1.50; the Minister of Public Works may inaugurate a parol system first spoken of by the late government.
