Miseries at St. Anne's

The lame, blind and dumb are everywhere. Quebec, July 26.—Pilgrims from Ontario and the United States returned to-night from the shrine of La Bonne Ste. Anne report a series of most miraculous cures during the religious celebration there to-day in honor of the festival of the saint. St. Anne's day always witnesses immense numbers of pilgrims at the shrine, though organized pilgrimages are discouraged for the Shrine. July 24th that the church would be overcrowded. Numbers of the Peterboro, Ont., pilgrims who arrived on Tuesday evening, however, and this morning witnessed the arrival of several hundred pilgrims from Utica, N. Y. Very Rev. Dr. Lynch, St. John's Church, was in charge, assisted by Rev. J. M. Murphy. Very pitiful were the condition and infirmities of some of the pilgrims who pressed forward to communicate and to venerate the relic to-day, and great indeed was the sensation as the various cures were reported.

Devid McLean, of 48 Tremont Street, Boston, has been perfectly crippled and unable to walk or even stand alone for four years. Since May he has lived at St. Anne, close to the church, and so much hotel accommodation is required for pilgrims that the little village has more of it than the whole city of Quebec. McLean sits on a wheel chair, which he props with his hands. He spends most of his time in the church for days past has assumed his friends that he would be cured today. Immediately after communicating he made the effort to stand and rose to his feet. He stepped forward a few feet, but was exhausted and again sat down. In the afternoon, after venerating the principal relic of the saint, a writ some presented by the Pope two years ago, he again got up and walked, stronger than ever. He presses strong faith in an early and permanent cure.

More striking even is the case of Miss L. Fitzmaurice, Grafton, Ont., who fell into a well two years ago, and has never been able to move since, except with crutches. After communion today she laid down her crutches and walked without them, but painfully and spasmodically. She left the church, but returned for vespers, kissed the relic, and walked away with the aid of a cane. A man named Orign had the right of his right eye restored, he says while invoking the saint today, though he had not used it before for some time.

Mrs. Hayes, of Peterboro, Ont., came here on Tuesday with her right arm so paralyzed that she could not cross herself. To-day strength came suddenly to the paralyzed limb, as she venerated the relic, and she waved her hand around her head in proof thereof.

An 11-year-old girl from Oatkoche had been dumb for eight years when, after invoking the aid of St. Anne and communicating, the string of her tongue was loosed and she cried out, "Bonne Ste. Anne, je vous remercie" (Good Ste. Anne, I thank you.) Most imposing were today's services.

Cardinal Taschereau was present, as was the Bishop of Chicoutimi. The procession of the saint of the afternoon, in which men, women, children, priests and nuns, the sick and the whole folk part, was most imposing of all. As they marched to the shrine in columns, the music of the organ, and the singing of the choir, was so loud and so loud, that it was as if a great earthquake had been let loose upon the world.
