Synopsis of Canadian North-West Land Regulations

Any person who is the sole head of tamily, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of svailable Dominion land in Manlioba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The appli cant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions by father, mother, ser, daughter, brother or sister of intending

Dutier Six months' residence upor and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by sim or by his father mother, son, daughter, brother or sis-

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price

Duties-Must reside uron ite beme stead or pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of home-stead entry (including the time required a homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has oxhanste his homestead right and cannot obtain a prs-emption may enter for a purchas ed homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside cix months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00. W. W CORY,
