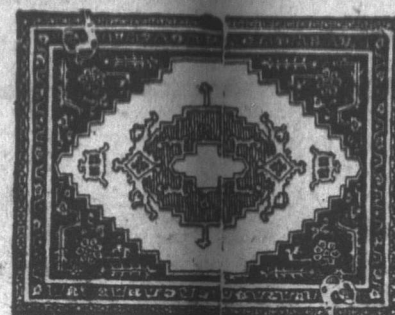
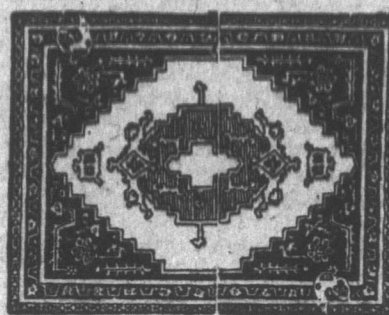

THE HOME FURNISHING SECTION

Household Notes.

While your layer cake is still hot, place marshmallows between the layers, and on top, and over the top layer pour a thick fudge frosting.

If two worn blankets are put together, covered with silkolins, and stitched with worsted, the resulting cover will be quite serviceable.

To 2 cupsful cold roast pork and a sliced carrot, an onion, a sweet pepper, a little macaroni, a chopped apple, and use in a casserole. Season it highly.

For delicious coleslaw use 4 cupsful of shredded cabbage, 2 chopped green peppers, 1 tablespoonful of salt, and one of paprika, and one-quarter cup-

ful vinegar. Let this mixture stand for thirty minutes before using.

Bread crumbs are often scattered when dry crusts are being put thru the food chopper. To avoid this, cut from thin cardboard a shape to fit the mouth of the chopper.

Good-sized hot biscuits make attractive individual shortcakes. Pull apart, butter, and garnish with canned peaches, drained and topped with sweetened whipped cream.

A simple but good sauce to serve with ice cream is made by boiling together three-quarters cupful of sugar with quarter cupful of water, and the same amount of raisins. Let cook for about five minutes, then flavor.
