## DISASTROUS FATE OF SOME ENDEAVORS

The Constructive Ability of Some Opposition Members Unsuccessful

### THE MAN WHO BUILT UP WHARF SCANDAL

The Facts in Connection With the Richibucto Incident

(Special Correspondence)

Ottawa, April 26.—Proceedings in the house of commons in the last few days in relation to a number of matters have furnished striking illustration of the constructive ability of some individual members of the opposition: the conspicuous feature of which has been a manifestation of the ability to extract what to the gentleman in question no doubt seemed a very large structure from a very meagre supply of material.

First came the demonstration of capacity in this respect by Dr. Bradbury, the member for Selkirk, who sought to build up an edifice of graft in the interior department in connection with the surrender of St. Peter's Indian reserve. Then followed Mr. Crockett of York with his palace of corruption in the Public Works department and lastly, or most recently rather for doubtless they are not all done, Mr. Taylor of New Westminster with his batch of irregularities in the department of the minister of justice.

But unhappily the gentlemen built upon the sand, and being short of foundation material their structures came tumbling about their ears when the first wave of facts from the government side of the chamber swept away their underpinning.

The effort of the member for Selkirk has been dealt with in this correspondence. That of Mr. Crockett of York, was less pretentious, although it required nearly as much time and labor. The member attempted to revive his alleged sawdust wharf scandal at Richibucto, N.B., which was threshed out before the public accounts committee in the early part of the session.

Insinuation that the minister of public works had knowingly been a party to the purchase of the wharf in question at a price four times as great as the vendor had paid for it, and that the supposed profit of the selling party had gone toward the campaign expenses of the member for Kent county, constituted the charge, but on behalf of the minister it was clearly shown that the wharf was not only worth all the government had paid for it but much more, and that so far from any part of the purchase money having gone to the campaign fund of the member for Kent, the individual had been the first to call the attention of the minister to the matter and to suggest that too high a price had been paid. This had been done at a time when it was supposed the government had only purchased a small portion of the property, but when the complete member had learned that the government had got a wharf over 700 feet long and nine acres of land running from the water front to the main street of the town, he had himself declared the property very cheaply.

The apparently large percentage of profit realized by the vendor was shown to have not been at all extraordinary by a recital of the facts in relation to several sales of wharves wherein the properties had been purchased at times when there was no demand for them but which later came into demand and brought prices not only four times as great as the vendor had bought them but even hundreds of times as great.

Then came the play of the member for New Westminster in a complaint that the franking privilege of the post office department was being abused by the sending of political campaign material through the mails free, but it didn't get very far before being exploded with most discomfiting remarks for the opposition. The minister of justice dealt the unkind blow by raising some of the facts in relation to conservative members' closing the mails with franked campaign matter and wound up by reciting the details of an attempt made while he was post master general, by a Conservative member still sitting in the house, to frank through the mails a sack of oats and that member had the grace to get up and acknowledge the truth of the statement.

In each instance a want of confidence motion was voted down by a heavy majority, and only two purposes can be said to have been served by the oblique attacks on the government. One served to contrast the statesmanship displayed on the opposite sides of the chamber in a light anything but favorable to the opposition; the other, by demonstrating the constructive ability of the gentlemen involved, served to bring them into prominence as available material for membership on the platform committee of the forthcoming Conservative convention.

## THE EARTH OPENED AND THE CATTLE ARE LOST

Gravice Six to Eight Feet Wide Opened and Ranchers Leave District

Reno, Nev., April 29.—Residents of Jakes Valley, 24 miles west of Ely, are driving their cattle to higher ground today following the appearance of great crevices in the earth, which suddenly opened and swallowed a large number of cattle.

The crevices, many of them from six to eight feet wide, filled with water. Thus far ranchers have found about 50 head of cattle dead in the newly-made water-holes.

The information of the strange action of nature was brought to Ely by Robert Burke, a government forestry employee.

It is believed the disturbance was of a local nature.

## DIRECT TO CALGARY WITH C.N.R. STEEL

Grading and Track Laying is Being Rushed Towards Calgary

(Camrose Canadian) The Canadian Northern steel arrived here last Saturday, the diamond-crossing the C. P. R. tracks being placed Saturday afternoon. The main track and a half mile siding was laid on Monday forenoon, the gang pushing south from town on Monday afternoon. They are now about six miles south of town and are laying steel at the rate of two miles per day.

The cooking outfit are on the siding here and will not move until the siding seven miles south of town is completed. The tank gang have completed the tank at Lake de May and are working south of town. A man has been placed in charge of the Lake de May tank, and water for the locomotive is now being obtained there. The telegraph gang are about two and one-half miles north and will have their wires strung into town by the end of the week.

Mr. Webster, who has charge of the steel outfit, stated that it would take them about two months to lay the steel to the end of the present grade, and he was of the opinion that by that time the graders would be very close to Calgary and that very likely he would be able to lay the steel into Calgary before he left this branch. The fact that two hundred thousand ties are being shipped from British Columbia over the C.P.R. into Camrose by the Canadian Northern shows that this line is being rushed to completion as rapidly as possible.
