Populace. The Emperor Greeted With a Mighty

imperial visitor to the effect that the lord mayor and corporation desired to offer him a sincere welcome and declaring his visit to the Queen to be a happy augury of the continuance of the friendly and affectionate relations so long existing between the two nations, also welcoming the Empress. The address was presented in a gold casket, richly enameled and decorated with precious atones. The Emperor replied:

"My lord,—Please receive my heartielt thanks for the warm welcome extended to us by the citizens of this ancient and noble metropolis. I beg your lordship to kindly transmit the expression of my feelings to those in whose name you have spoken. I have always felt at home in this lovely country, being the grandson of your Queen, whose name will ever be remembered of a noble character and of a lady great in the wisdom of her councils, and whose reign has conferred lasting blessings upon England. Moreover, the same blood runs in English as in German veins, and following the example of my grandiather and my ever-lamented father, I shall always, so far as in my power, maintain the historical friendship existing between these, our two nations, which, as your lordship has so often mentioned, have so often been side by side in defense of liberty and justice. I feel encouraged in my task when I see these capital men, such as are gathered here to-day, do justice to the earnestness and honesty of my intentions. My aim is above all the maintenance of peace, for peace alone can give the confidence necessary to a healthy development of science, art and trade. Only so long as peace reigns are we at liberty to bestow earnest thoughts upon the great problems the solution of which in fairness and equity I consider the most prominent duty of our time. You may therefore rest assured that I shall continue to do my best to maintain and constantly increase the good relations existing between Germany and other nations. I shall always be found ready to unite with you and them in the common labor for peaceful progress, friendly int

New York, July 10.—Dr. L. S. Painter, of Pittsburg, arrived from aboard yesterday. He was one of the first Americans to be treated in Berlin with Koch's tubercule. In speaking of his case yesterday he said: My experience was horrible, I am afraid they have killed me, they have killed them off over there by hundreds; but now the lymph treatment is used in only two hospitals, and nearly all the physicians of reputation and skill have discarded it."

Dr. Painter said Prof. Virchow, who has performed hundreds of autopsies in lymph

performed hundreds of autopsies in lymph cases, has established the fact that instead of working as a cure the lymph will actually transfer tuberculosis, and that on analysis it will disclose the presence of bacteria.

A New Atlantic Steamship Line.

BALTIMORE, July 10.—The Chesapeake and Ohio Railway Company has closed a five years contract with a steamship owner in England for three regular lines of steamers from New Port, Va., to Liverpool, London and Glasgow, and also for occasional steamers to Havre and Antwerp. These will be the first regular European steamer lines from any port south of Baltimore.

The Cattle-Carrying Trade.

London, July 11.—In reply to an influential deputation Mr. Chaplin, Minister of Agriculture, made an important statement respecting the Cattle Trade Bill. He denied that the bill would or could affect the price of meat. The sole object was to prevent cattle while crossing the Atlantic experiencing the horrible sufferings recently disclosed, and to compel the vety small minority of bad ship-owners to do what good ship-owners already did. If the bill could not be passed this session he should issue a further regulation under the existing powers of the Board after a conference with the ship-owners. His duty was to prevent the animals suffering, and he intended to the utmost of his ability to discharge that duty however strongly he might be opposed.

His address of an hour had the effect of thinning out the members until very few remained to listen to his tangled arguments.
