DR. PARKHURST BLAMES THE REPUBLICANS.

Paris, Nov. 5.-Rev. Dr. Chas. H. Parkhurst gave out the following statement in regard to the Democratic victory in New York city: "If New York has not moral genius

from them, may the Lord have mercy on New York. "Republican votes have restored Tammany to power, and upon the men who cast them will devolve the responsibility for the jobbery and van-dalism of the next four years; and don't let us forget it.

"New York will not become a respectable city till its clergy are so pos-sessed of the spirit of the old prophets as to be prepared to put governing pressure upon secular events; till the press becomes so distinctly and unwaveringly the exponent of unmarketable truth as to command the confidence of the reading public; till reputable citizens are sufficiently wedded of the general tendency and integrity. New York, Nov. 5.—Senator Marcus A. Hanna telegraphs as follows to the Evening World of today: "They tell me I am sure of a re-election; that is all I know about it. It is an off year, and compared with elections that usually follow presidential years in Ohio, I think there is nothing to complain of. The weather was against the Republicans this year, and good times have made them careless. I don't think the ered cheap at this figure. result has much significance as to the money question. I don't see how the Democrats can reasonably bring silver to be considered as affected either way.

Columbus, Ohio, Nov. 5.—The political situation in Ohio is still unsettled, but the Republicans believe they are justified in claiming the Legislature by five on joint ballot.
