—Major Guillot, of the Twenty-first Fusiliers, and treasurer of Windsor, returned there Saturday morning from this city, where he has been going through a special course at the Military School. He returns with a first-class certificate which entitles him to hold the rank of Lieutenant-colonel.

—Mr. L. Egan was up in the peach district of Leamington last week. He reports that Messrs. Dickson Bros., Hamilton and Lawson, of this city, have bought up all the peach orchards in that locality, except those owned by Mr. Tyhurst. Mr. Egan thinks peaches will be no cheaper than what they are selling for at present.

THE "COMMERCIAL FORM."
The Board of Education held a special meeting on Saturday afternoon with the following members present: Trustees Sanders, Griffin, Hunt, Craig, Turner, Murphy, Jeffrey, Johnston, Wilkins and Dr. Campbell, Secretary McElheran and Principal Merchant. Trustee Hunt explained that the meeting was called to consider a matter that was now in an undecided position. There was a motion passed some time ago that a commercial form be introduced into the public schools at the opening after vacation. Trustee Logan put in a motion last meeting to reconsider this at the next regular meeting in September. To decide whether this form is needed in the public schools Mr. Hunt proposed to test the views of the citizens. If they received only 25 or 30 answers they would take it for granted that the form was not wanted, but on the other hand if they received 75 or 100, or 150 applicants they would know that the people wanted the form and they could get it in working order. It was then moved by Trustee Hunt seconded by Trustee Griffin that the following advertisement be placed in the daily papers: "Commercial form pupils, attention. All pupils having passed the junior fourth or entrance examination, wishing to study commercial subjects in the public schools, are requested to present themselves to Principal R. M. Graham, at Simcoe street school, or make application to the secretary of the Board of Education, stating whether they have passed the High School entrance, or before Tuesday the third of September." Number one ward's representatives objected to having Principal Graham's name in the advertisement, but the motion carried with Trustees Craig and Jeffrey voting nay.
