To Depose the Sultan

Britain Said to Be About to Sound the Powers.
Latest Developments in the Supposed Dynamite Conspiracy.

Threats Made to Blow Up the British Embassy at Constantinople.

WEALTHY MERCHANTS SHOT.
Madrid, Sept. 15.—Among the insurgents shot at Cavite, Philippine Islands, were two merchants, whose joint fortunes amounted to 10,000,000 francs; the governor of the prison at Cavite and several doctors and chemists.
DROWNED IN THE RHINE.
Berlin, Sept. 15.—Owing to the collapse of a gangway landing at Buesingen, as a number of passengers were being landed from a steamer, 45 persons were thrown into the Rhine. Three were drowned, five were pulled out of the water in a critical condition, and it is feared that others are missing.

DALY'S RECEPTION.
Dublin, Sept. 15.—John Daly, a republican dynamite, was accorded a reception on his arrival at Queenstown. In reply to an address Daly declared he was not a dynamite, and that he never believed in its use. He was also given a reception at Dublin, where he reiterated his remarks made at Queenstown.
MIMIC WAR THAT COSTS LIFE.
Berlin, Sept. 15.—In the artillery maneuvers which were held at Goerlitz, at least three men were killed; one man was crushed to death under a gun; a lancer and his horse were killed by falling into a quarry, and another man lost his life by falling from his horse and impaling himself upon his lance.

THE SOUDAN EXPEDITION.
Cairo, Sept. 15.—Word has been received here from the front that the Egyptian troops with the Nile expedition are concentrating at Perel, which is only 23 miles from the Dervish outpost at Kerna, where the Dervishes have been concentrating reinforcements of cavalry as though with the intention of making a stand against the British advance.
SOUNDING THE POWERS.
London, Sept. 15.—The Chronicle publishes a dispatch from its Berlin correspondent, who says it is believed that Great Britain is about to sound the powers in the expediency of joint action in deposing the Sultan.

In Parliament.

Scandalous Transactions Laid Bare Yesterday.
Contract Conditions Ruthlessly Broken to Favor Friends.
No More Liquor to Be Given Out in the Commons' Restaurant.

Said to Be Aimed at the Czar of Russia.
London, Sept. 15.—A semi-official communication on the subject of the recent arrests of the alleged dynamite conspirators says: "There has been within the full knowledge of the Scotland Yard officials for some time past a gang of desperadoes busily engaged in America in preparing the ramifications for an extensive and diabolical plot to perpetrate the most heinous crime in this country and to establish a reign of terror. Chief Inspector Melville, who has been so prominent in tracing and detecting these gangsters, has been the head of the Scotland Yard investigation for checking the present conspirators. Gradually and quietly a complete network of the conspirators, plotters, and the fact being known that they were in intimate communication with prominent Russian nihilists in the United States, enabled the police to discover, on what is believed to be absolute evidence, that one of the most recent developments of the scheme aimed at an outrage on the Czar upon the occasion of his visit to England. The prime movers were Fenians in America, and when the plot had been carried as far as possible the Tyrannical and the other chief agents were dispatched to Europe to consummate the designs adopted. Every precaution was taken in shipping them separately and by different routes. The emissaries of Scotland Yard, however, dogged their every movement."

The semi-official communication then deals with the arrest and capture of all the applicants documents, etc., and continues: "It is arranged that Bell should go to Glasgow to supervise a series of outbursts in Scotland, the explosives necessary being sent from Belgium as required. Bell had in his pockets between £200 and £400 and American letters of credit."
Devaney, McCulloch and McCard, three released dynamite men, who are shadowed since they were released from prison. In 1895 McCard visited America. It is considered probable that Bell will soon be removed from Glasgow to London.

Dispatches received from Brussels say that information obtained there from reliable sources indicate that the dynamite laboratory which was discovered at Antwerp were not Fenians, but Anarchists, whose aim was directed against the Czar, and it is known that the police at Antwerp were informed by the Scotland Yard authorities that a plot was in preparation to attempt to assassinate the Czar in London. Later dispatch from Rotterdam reports that the arrested there were in bed when the detectives entered their room. Several personal machines were found in their possession, and the quality of their correspondence in cipher, a key to which having been discovered, the correspondence was read, and is said to have been a record of their outrages, including an attempt upon the life of Queen Victoria.
