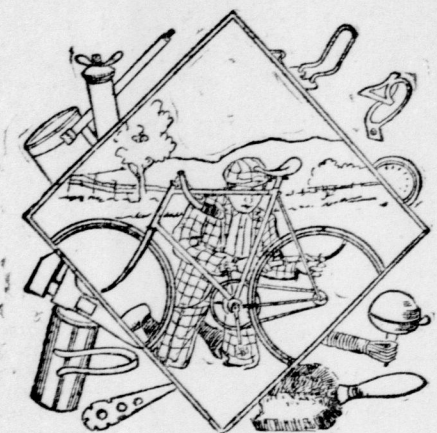

Toronto, May 27—8 p.m.—There are indications that the area of low pressure, which has determined the weather conditions in the lake region during the past week, causing cool, unsettled weather, will now pass to the Maritime Provinces, and that the weather will improve in Ontario. Very high temperature again prevails in Manitoba and the Northwest Territories, and Qu'Appelle reports 104° and Winnipeg 80°.

LIVED UNDER FIVE SOVEREIGNS.

The Montreal Herald of Saturday says: Mrs. Wm. Patterson, of this city, who is living with her daughter, Mrs. M. McDougall, here, has the distinction of not only living to see the fourth generation around her, but also of living under five British sovereigns. Mrs. Patterson, who is in her 80th year, was born at Burn of Ratier, in Caithness-shire, Scotland, and sailed with her husband for Canada on June 7, 1841, in the sailing ship Margaret Boyle (Capt. Smith), landing at Quebec, after a comparatively smooth passage, in five weeks and three days. From Quebec she came right on to Montreal, where she has resided ever since. Her husband, Mr. Wm. Patterson, who died in 1892, is well remembered as one of the best judges of horses in the Dominion of Canada. As before stated, Mrs. Patterson is living to see the fourth generation around her. Her two daughters are Mrs. McDougall, of Montreal, and Mrs. J. H. Hirschberger, of London, and her three sons are Mr. J. G. Patterson, contracting freight agent of the C. P. R.; Capt. C. E. A. Patterson, and Dr. Wm. Patterson, M. S., all of whom reside in Montreal. She has also nineteen grand children and three great grandchildren living.

TROLLEY FUNERALS.

Trolley funerals have not yet been tried in London, but, according to a dispatch, this is the way they do it in Illinois: The trolley funerals are the next thing on the programme. At Sterling, Ill., a company is forming for the purpose of building a complete line of funeral trolley cars. The hearse is an elaborate affair. Its upper part will be composed mainly of plate glass, the coffin resting in the middle of the car on a stand.

The motor is shut off from the main portion of the car, and privacy is assured for the dead. The car will be black.

Behind the trolley hearse will come a car carrying flowers. Its sides will be of plate glass, and there will be refrigerating apparatus for keep the flowers fresh.

Next will come a car for relatives and friends. The interior will be so arranged that the seats will look as much as possible like those of a private carriage. There will be practically three carriages to each car.

ACTORS IN A TERRIBLE TRAGEDY

Member of the Fuller Opera Company Kills His Fiance and Himself.

Key West, Florida, May 28.—A terrible tragedy was enacted here Sunday night at the cottage occupied by the D'Ormond Fuller Opera Company, as a result of which Miss Inez Leonard and Edgar Beaulieu, two members of the company, are dead. The latter had been drinking. About 2:30 o'clock members of the company were startled by the report of a rifle, and Inez Leonard screamed, "Help! help! I am dying!" Then another shot rang out. Members of the company rushed into the room, and found Miss Leonard in a dying condition. She was gasping for breath and died without regaining consciousness. She was shot through the left side just below the heart, the bullet coming out on the right side. Beaulieu was lying on the opposite side of the room, his face covered with blood. He was dead. An examination showed that he had shot himself through the mouth, and the bullet remained in his head. A 48-calibre Martini rifle and two empty shells were mute evidence of the tragedy. The rifle, stained with blood, was lying by Beaulieu.

When questioned as to the cause of the tragedy, Manager D'Ormond said it was a mystery to every member of the company. Inez Leonard and Edgar Beaulieu were always very affectionate towards each other. They were engaged, and expected to be married as soon as they went north. There had been no quarrel, or anything approaching an examination of the cause of the tragedy. Beaulieu was born in Chicago, and was adopted by Miss Fuller, one of the company, when four years old. He was raised and educated under her care. Inez Leonard was from Philadelphia. Her mother and father are both on the stage.

SUDDEN DEMISE OF A MINISTER

Rev. Louis Zahn Dr.-ps Dead at the Laying of a Corner Stone.

Quincy, Ill., May 28.—The Rev. Louis Zahn, pastor of St. John's Lutheran Church, dropped dead Sunday afternoon while delivering an address at the laying of the corner-stone of the new building being erected by St. Jacob's Church, at Eighth and Washington streets. The ceremonies incident to the laying of the corner-stone this afternoon were elaborate, and were attended by an immense audience of several thousand people.

The Rev. J. H. Hirschberger, of St. Louis, made the first address, and then Mr. Zahn arose to deliver the sermon. As he arose to deliver his address it was seen that his face was a little flushed, but he had not complained to anyone of feeling ill. He had spoken but a few minutes when he sank to the floor of the platform on which he was standing. He died in two minutes.

When the announcement was made that Dr. Zahn was dead the corner-stone was hurriedly laid by the Rev. Wm. Hallenberg, the pastor of St. Jacob's Church, without further ceremonies.
