LATEST MARKETS

DAIRY MARKETS

Hay, oats and dressed hogs were the features at today's market. The smaller lines were not so well represented as usual for this day of the week. Sales were brisk for all of the offerings, excepting hay and apples.

Grain—About 25 loads of oats were offered, most of the sales being made at \$1 to \$1.02 per cwt. A couple of choice loads of black oats sold at \$1.03 per cwt.

Hay and Straw—The supply of hay was large, about 40 loads being offered. Prices were lower at \$7.50 to \$8.50 for choice hay. Most of the sales were made at \$7.50 and \$7.80 per cwt. Straw went at \$7 per ton. Straw sold at \$6 per ton.

Butter and Eggs—There was not a great deal offered; prices were as quoted.

Apples—Sales were slow for the small quantity offered; prices were about the same as those paid on Saturday.

Vegetables and Rooted—Several loads of potatoes were offered; Potatoes by the load sold at \$7.50 for 6 to 10-bag sacks was asked. Celery, 40c to 50c per dozen.

Dressed Hogs—About eighty carcasses were offered; sales were made mostly at \$7.75 and \$7.85 per cwt. for light hogs; some heavy hogs went at \$5.75 and \$6 per cwt. The demand is good; prices are likely to be higher.

Poultry—A few lots of turkeys went at \$1 to \$1.50 per lb, dressed, or \$1 to \$1.25 per lb live; dressed chickens, \$1.00 to \$1.10 per lb; the quality offered was not of the best.

Butcher's Meat—There was a fair supply; sales were slow at \$4.50 to \$5 per cwt for beef, \$7 to \$8 per cwt for veal; lamb was in good demand at 10c per lb.

BRITAIN LOSES IN ARBITRATION

Results So Far Have Not Favored That Method.

CONDENSED LOCAL NEWS SOME OF THE CASES DECIDED

The Alabama Incident Alone Cost the British Government Over \$10,000,000.

London, Jan. 30.—The experience of Great Britain in the arbitration courts of international disputes has not, in the past, proved satisfactory. That war is a barbarous method of settling disputes between nations few will deny, and these few will number among them either those who have experienced its realities, or are cognizant of the subsequent misery it carries in its train. We deplore the advent of war, and in the great cause of Christianity and civilization we are ready to record our votes for the arbitration principles of the world.

In the year 1822 a difference of opinion arose between Great Britain and the United States as to the interpretation to be placed upon certain clauses in the treaty of Ghent, which was signed in 1814. The arbiters in this case were the Emperor of Russia, and his award was in favor of the United States. In 1863 a dispute arose between Great Britain and Portugal. Without going back a quarter of a century of questioning the rectitude of the arbiters' decision, recent events in South Africa must bring home to all of us the fact that arbitration is a means to pay the enormous sum of £2,800,000 sterling, and what is infinitely more important, it is a means to deny to the British the right of possession of Delagoa Bay and the adjoining territory. It was agreed to leave the settlement of the question of ownership to the decision of the late Marshal MacMahon, but the British representative alone dissented as excessive, was that of Great Britain's concession to pay the enormous sum of £2,800,000 sterling, and what is infinitely more important, it is a means to deny to the British the right of possession of Delagoa Bay and the adjoining territory.

Fifty-Five Per Cent of Deaths Dehated by Ayr in the Ontario Recorded Month of People

Between 50 and 88 Years.

Vital statistics compiled by City Clerk Baker show that during the month of January there were 54 births, 29 marriages and 43 deaths in London.

In January, 1904, there were 73 births, 23 marriages and 59 deaths, and in January, 1903, 49 births, 40 marriages and 66 deaths were recorded in London.

Thus, as compared with a year ago, there were during the month of January this year, 19 fewer births, 7 more marriages and 32 fewer deaths.

A feature of the death record is that of the 43 deaths, 24 were of people between the ages of 50 and 88. This is equal to 55 per cent of the total death rate for the month. From this is apparent that January has been an exceedingly hard month on old people.

Many of these deaths are attributed to old age, but 4 resulted from near disaster, 1 from typhoid fever, and several from paralysis.

Fire department returns for the month of January show that there responded to 12 alarms during January. Six of these were fires, 4 were chimney blazes and 2 were false alarms. The most serious of the fires was one at a Dundas street drygoods store, the London Brass Works and the Bank of Toronto.
