From this is appears that January has been an exceedingly hard month on old people. Many of these deaths are attributed to old age, but 4 resulted from neart disease, 1 from typheid fever, and several from paralysis.

Fire department returns for the month show that the brigades responded to 12 alarms during January. Six of these were fires, 4 were chimney blazes and 2 were false alarms. The most serious fires were those of a don Brass Works and the Bank of Toronto.
