To Install Stoves. — Orders have been issued by Superintendent W. R. Davidson, of the Grand Trunk, to equip all coaches which are to be used to conduct immigrants from seaports to Ontario points with cook stoves. This is to give the people an opportunity of preparing meals on the trains.

Victory for Woman's Suffrage. — Women's suffrage gained another victory on Tuesday evening when the debaters of St. David's A. Y. P. A. went down to defeat before the team from All Saints' Church. The affirmative was upheld by Messrs. Roy Mess and Sid Jones, of All Saints', and the negative by Miss Menel and Mr. C. Parkinson, of St. David's. The judges were Messrs. Reid and Messrs. Parsons and Morris. After the debate a social hour was spent and refreshments were served.

Preparations at Industrial School. — Everybody is busy this week at the Industrial School. Extensive preparations are going on at the school for the exhibition of work to be held on Friday and Saturday afternoons and evenings. All the classes are making special efforts to complete the work in hand in time for the exhibit. The woodworking class expects to have an extensive exhibit. One feature of the woodworking exhibit will be about 40 solid oak upholstered chairs made by the students during the winter term. The exhibit of dressmaking and millinery will also be extensive. The exhibition will be open to the public.

**TO MAKE HOUSE-TO-HOUSE INSPECTION**

Board of Health Provides

\$250 for Purpose in

Estimates.

MANY ARE SEEKING JOBS

Discussion of Germ Problem—Ice Purity, Milk and Dust.

House-to-house inspection will be made by the board of health this spring, \$250 going into the 1913 estimates for the purpose, the total amount asked for being \$4,055 as against \$3,750 for 1912.

Half dozen applications for employment as sanitary inspectors for the annual spring clean-up were received, but the board left the appointments with the chairman, Dr. Burdon and Sanitary Inspector James Lutman.

Cannot Get Help. — In his monthly report, Mr. Lutman stated that he had notified 37 property owners in the downtown district to clean up their premises, the majority explaining their negligence on the ground of difficulty in securing labor.

Dr. Burdon reported to the board that the Inspector of Public Health is at last ready to analyze water, and will soon be ready to analyze milk. Samples have been taken from the ponds where the city ice supply is garnered and analyzed will be made for the first time in the city.

Purity of Ice. — Dr. Burdon and other members of the board referred to Dr. Hill's articles on the purity of ice, in which Dr. Hill claimed that impurities are expelled in the natural process of freezing. How could the board enforce regulations in regard to the force of ice in the face of this claim? asked Dr. Burdon. If ice is always pure why analyze samples of the water from which it is taken?

The board appeared to think that samples of the ice ought to be analyzed rather than the water from which it is taken.

Drying Dust Germs. — Dr. Hill having also declared that the germs in dust are killed in the process of drying, the members of the board wanted to know how they could

**60,000 SCHOLARS STRIKE**

Police Obligated To Suppress Disorderly Scenes By Youngsters.

Pittsburg, April 23.—Hardly 10 per cent. of Pittsburg's 70,000 school children are in attendance at the sessions today. While the disorderly processions of children through the streets that characterized yesterday's situation have been suppressed by police aided by parents, large numbers of children congregated about schoolhouses, but are soon scattered by a detail of police that has been stationed at each of the 122 schools of the city.

The children arrested yesterday while carrying banners demanding the removal of Superintendent Heeler were today brought before a police magistrate, and after a reprimand, were turned over to their parents. The police orders are to refrain from arresting school children unless they annoy pedestrians or damage property.

A hundred or more pupils of the high school refused to attend sessions this morning, but maintained order when ordered to move away from the vicinity of the school buildings. All available patrolmen are still on duty.
