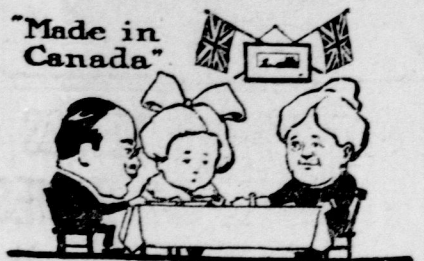

CHILE SENDS WARSHIPS TO JUAN FERNANDEZ

Prompt to Carry Out Neutrality Intentions.

VALPARAISO, Chile, Nov. 25.—In pursuance of its announced intention of enforcing strict neutrality, the Chilean Government today dispatched the destroyers Captain Merino, Tarpa and Captain O'Brien to the Juan Fernandez Islands, Chilean possessions 400 miles off the coast. The warships sailed under sealed orders.

The authorities at the port of Antofagasta removed vital parts of the engine of the German steamer Karnack, notwithstanding the promise of the German minister that German steamers would not leave Chilean ports.

FAMILIES BURIED IN COLLAPSED PALACE

Messina, Nov. 26.—One of the palaces damaged by the earthquake in 1908, owing to bad weather, suddenly collapsed, burying three families in the ruins. Rescuers immediately went to work and saved two children. The number of persons still in the ruins is not definitely known.

CARRANZA SEEMS RATHER PLEASED

Is Apparently Satisfied That Villa and Zapata Have Joined Forces At Capital.

Vera Cruz, Nov. 26.—The occupation of Mexico City by the forces of Gen. Carranza and the apparent understanding that has been reached between the southern leader and Gen. Villa appear to be pleasing rather than otherwise to Gen. Carranza's supporters here, who, it is supposed, reflect Carranza's opinion in this respect.

In general the plan now will be to besiege Zapata and Villa, cutting every railroad and starving them into surrender if possible, but forcing their capitulation at that point in any way which may become necessary.

Ysidro Fabela, Carranza's minister of foreign affairs, who has located his offices here, expressed the conviction last night that the task of subduing Zapata and Villa would not be nearly so difficult as appeared. He admitted that the consequences for Mexico City would be bad. He also admitted that already there had been received news that followers of Zapata had sacked certain parts of the capital, although there were no reports to indicate the extent to which this had been carried out, but he regarded this as one of the necessary consequences incident to warfare.

Just who is in control of Mexico City is not known here by the Carranza officials, according to Senor Fabela. It is reported that neither Gen. Zapata nor Gen. Villa actually is in the city, but that they have sent forward one or whom they have agreed as their representative.

Gen. Obregon and Blanco are occupying strategic positions east of Mexico City.

CIVILIANS' EXCHANGE PROCEEDS RAPIDLY
French, Germans and Austrians Passing Through Switzerland in Special Trains.

Berne, Switzerland, Nov. 25, via Paris, Nov. 26.—The exchange of civilians under or above military age interned in belligerent countries is being actively carried out. Within the past few days over 5,000 such persons have passed through Switzerland. They included 700 French, 1,000 Austrians and 3,500 Germans. They were transported in special trains each carrying 500 persons.

It is estimated that there are still 20,000 Germans interned in France, and according to German newspapers between 150,000 and 180,000 in Russia. Several thousand women, children and old men, it is charged by these newspapers, have been sent in their summer clothing to Siberia, where, destitute of all means, their situation is deplorable, as it seems no means have yet been found to effect their exchange.

GERMANS GET AID IN SOUTH AMERICA

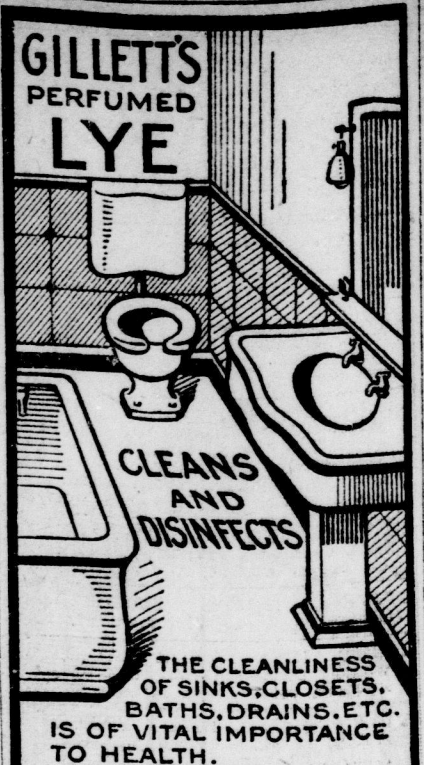
Colombia and Ecuador Violate Neutrality.

LONDON, Nov. 25.—Great Britain and France have appealed to the United States to exercise its good offices to compel Colombia to observe more strictly the requirements of neutrality. Otherwise the Allies, it was announced in the House of Commons today, may be compelled in self-defence to take whatever measures they deem necessary for the protection of their interests.

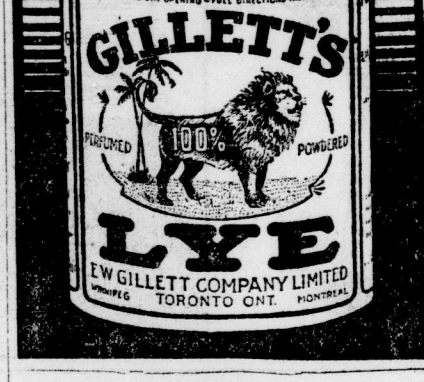
Charles Roberts, under secretary of the colonial department, speaking on behalf of the foreign office, made this announcement today. He said that information in the possession of the government indicated that the governments of Colombia and Ecuador had failed in certain respects to observe an attitude of strict neutrality, and that their failure to do so was likely to be detrimental to the interests of this country.

Germans Use Ecuador Territory.
Mr. Roberts went on to say that a similar communication had been sent to Washington with respect to Ecuador, whose foreign minister "had himself informed the British charge and his French colleagues that German warships had converted certain islands belonging to Ecuador into naval bases."

Mr. Roberts said that the Government of Ecuador had failed to comply with the request of Great Britain and France to exercise proper control of wireless.

ALLIED ENEMIES FIGHT AT PRZEMYSL

Clash Reported and Commandant Said To Have Been Hanged.

LEMBERG, Galicia, Nov. 25 (Via London).—The sound of firing, which was said to be the result of a clash between the Germans and Austrians composing the garrison of Przemyśl, was reported by refugees arriving here today from the vicinity of the Austrian fortress.

The sound came from the fortifications on the interior line and was audible for a distance of two miles. At first it was believed that the troops had fired on mutinous inhabitants in Przemyśl, but later the refugees say, the above cause was learned.

It was further reported that the Germans had hanged the commandant of the fortress because he proposed to surrender the citadel. The Austrians are said to have opposed the measures put into effect by the Germans, which resulted in a pitched battle in the streets.

Wounded Austrians returning from the Carpathians and from the south of Lemberg report that the Austrians are retreating in utter defeat. Their losses are said to have been very heavy and they have included 8,000 prisoners and all the supplies. Toward Cracow the retreat is said to have been made in better order.

Von Moltke Denies It.
PRAGUE, Bohemia, via London, Nov. 26.—1:10 a.m. The Tagblatt's Frankfurt (Germany) correspondent says that in an interview Field Marshal Count Von Moltke, the German chief of staff, declared there was no foundation for the reports that there had been conflicts between the Austro-Hungarians and the military commandant of Przemyśl.

DON'T ALLOW WAR TO HURT MISSIONS

W.M.S. Convention Delegates Advised To Redouble Their Efforts.

A RECORD ATTENDANCE

Big Representation of Members From Various Circles and Bands of Society.

Hyatt Avenue Methodist Church was filled almost to capacity yesterday afternoon, when delegates from London district assembled for the annual district gathering of the Women's Missionary Society. The central theme of the afternoon seemed to be an emphasis upon the need of more workers in the mission field. Mrs. Gordon Wright presided at this point in her address. She also urged her hearers not to relax their efforts in their missionary endeavors because of the war. There were many calls at present for patriotic and relief purposes, but it was very necessary that the mission work did not decrease. Mrs. Wright referred to the great opportunities for service and sacrifice at the front of the battle-line. "The men of our country, and the women, too, are serving and sacrificing for our earthly King and empire. Shall we, members of the W. M. S., not be willing to do as much for our Heavenly King?" asked Mrs. Wright.

Japan Missionary Speaks.
Miss Drake, returned missionary from Japan, spoke briefly of her work, and stated her joy at being welcomed again. During the year of her mission work Miss Drake is one of three white women in a town of 30,000 people. It was very encouraging, she said, to see so many girls and children belong to the mission circles and bands, and she urged that there be more volunteers from the front for work in home and foreign fields.

The meeting was opened at 2:30 o'clock with prayer by Mrs. McCamus, followed by a Bible reading by Mrs. H. A. Graham. Reports of auxiliary societies occupied a portion of the session, encouraging progress being reported from the following auxiliaries: Arva, Balaies, Belmont, Brick Street, Delaware, DeWester, Lewis and Clark, Centennial, Colborne Street, Dundas Centre, Empress Avenue, Hill Street, First Methodist, Hyatt Avenue, Kensington, Kensington, Ridout Street, Hill Street, Kensington, Kensington, and Wellington street; Leam, Leam, Littlewood, North Street, Putnam, Salem, Sharon, Thamesford, The Grove, Thorncliffe and White Oak.

Circles and bands from Arva, Dorchester, First Methodist, Dundas Centre, Askim, Empress Avenue, Colborne Street, Hill Street, Kensington, Kensington, and Wellington street; Leam, Leam, Littlewood, North Street, Putnam, Salem, Sharon, Thamesford, The Grove, Thorncliffe and White Oak.

Evening Session.
Miss Drake was the principal speaker at the evening session, when she spoke of the work carried on in the mission stations of Japan among the children, the girls and women. The missionary spoke especially of the children in the city where she is stationed, Ueda, where they work along educational and evangelistic lines. Kindergarten are maintained for the children, and the Japanese parents are now quite anxious for their little ones to attend these. The attendance in Ueda at the various kindergartens is 104 daily. At Christmas, special exercises and lessons are conducted as a treat for the children. The parents send gifts to place upon the tree. Through the kindergartens the older ones are often brought to the gospel. Many of the little ones attend Sunday school. The street Sunday schools are also a feature of the work.

Training Japanese Girls.
The training of Japanese girls for kindergarten teachers is also a special endeavor of the missionaries. These student-teachers are being trained in the teaching of music (both vocal and instrumental), Bible study, and visit in the homes. The work among the factory girls, while slow, was encouraging. The missionaries tried to bring about better conditions for the girls, many of whom worked from 4:30 a.m. until 7 at night. Visiting the homes of the Japanese, and endeavoring to teach the mothers was another branch of missionary endeavor. Mothers' meetings were also held. "Some of our converts are most earnest Christians," said Miss Drake, "and there is not the slightest doubt but that God can save the souls of others besides white people."

Mrs. Harvey Re-elected.
Mrs. (Rev.) Harvey, the re-elected district organizer, spoke briefly, reviewing the work of the district. The Women's Missionary Society was responsible for the support of 119 missionaries and 100 Bible women, and it required the united efforts of all members to keep these in the field. Mrs. Harvey urged more organization among the young people of the church for missionary effort, pleading that every Sunday school child might be brought to the mission band or circle. Two very fine selections by the choir, a reading, "The Legend Beautiful" (Longfellow), by Miss Irene Plewes, with piano accompaniment by Mr. C. Sumner, brought to a close the evening's program. Rev. J. E. Millard presided.

The ladies of Hyatt Avenue Methodist Church served a very bountiful supper to the convention delegates between 6 and 8.

ISSUE BATTERY UNIFORMS

137 Men of Unit Now Quartered at Queen's Park.

The battery of 137 men recently organized here, and quartered in Queen's Park, received uniforms yesterday for the first time, and wore them in the parade to do honor to Major-General Hughes. The rest of the equipment has not been received. The battery is now 15 strong, under command of Capt. E. L. Jones and Lieut. Forbes-Mitchell. The rest of the men are expected to report in another week.
