FRENCH OBJECT TO INCREASE PHONE RATES

Thousands of Subscribers Threaten To Give Up Their Instruments.

OBJECT TO EXCESS CALL

American Syndicate Offer To Take Over System Might Be Considered.

PARIS, Sept. 27.—Americans trying to do business in Paris have for a long time complained of the inefficiency of the French telephone system, with its interminable waits for even the shortest distance calls, but now it seems certain that the difficulties in this connection will increase if the Chamber of Deputies approves the new telephone law proposed. Thousands of telephone subscribers, including large business firms, declare they will take up the instruments rather than pay what they regard as an excessive rate.

Telephone service here now costs only 700 francs a year, but the telephone ministry intends to fix yearly subscriptions at 55 francs, with a charge of 25 centimes for every call in excess of 1,000 a year.

Important firms have counted the number of calls sent out over their telephones daily, and have calculated that under the new rates it will cost some of them more than 25,000 francs a year for telephone service.

Cafes and restaurants, which have never charged customers for the use of their telephones, declare they will be compelled to increase their prices, as the French public, after years of gratuitous telephone service, will not be willing to pay for it.

An American telephone syndicate offered last year to take over the Paris telephone system and operate it after the American plan and charge minimum rates, but the offer was refused. Now, however, there is a strong possibility that, should this syndicate's offer be renewed, it would be accorded serious consideration, as the French budget situation is too dangerous to permit the wholesale cancellation of telephone rentals.

IGNORANCE CAUSE OF MANY FIRES

OTTAWA, Sept. 28.—(By Canadian Press).—Fire-preventive week, beginning on Sunday, Oct. 9, and ending the following Saturday, has been appointed by order-in-council, and the proclamation is made through a special number of the Canada Gazette.

The proclamation calls attention to the fact that more than three hundred persons in Canada annually lose their lives as a result of fires. Furthermore, it is insisted that at least eighty per cent of the fires which occur are the result of inexcusable ignorance or neglect.

During fire-preventive week, citizens are recommended to inspect their homes and stores and other buildings, and to remove rubbish and otherwise reduce fire hazards.

Safety First Aim of Flyers

Will Leave Nothing to Chance in Flight Around World.

LONDON, Sept. 28.—(By Canadian Press Cable).—"We are leaving nothing to chance," was Sir Keith Smith's parting shot to an interviewer after outlining the precautions he and his brother, Sir Roy Smith, are taking to insure their success in their flight around the world next spring.

"We are pretty certain that the flight will be made some day, and we are keen to have the honor go to a Britisher," said Sir Keith.

The route has not yet been decided, but Sir Keith favors crossing the Atlantic first to get the stiffest part of the journey over early.

The Smith brothers with two sergeants left London on November 12, 1919, in a Vickers-Vimy machine in an attempt to fly to Australia. On December 10 they landed at Port Darwin, Australia, and won the Australian Government's £30,000 prize for having covered 11,294 miles in just under 23 days.

PRE-WAR WAGES NOT BASIS NOW

MONTREAL, Sept. 28.—(By Canadian Press).—Argument was presented here this afternoon on behalf of the railway unions, at the conciliation board appointed to look into the dispute in connection with the proposed reduction by about twelve per cent in wages. The argument was given by G. F. Wark, vice-president of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Engineers, who contended that pre-war wages should not be considered as a basis for present discussion since, he claimed, they had been altogether inadequate, while the advances in the McAdoo schedule did not keep pace with the advancing cost of living.

Further, he pointed out that the nature of the employment whom he represented with engineers and trainmen in charge of equipment worth around half a million dollars for each train, as well as the lives of passengers, or great values of freight, was such that these men should not be compelled to work for a bare living, but be given pay commensurate with the dangers and responsibilities met in their work.

A statement was also read on behalf of the Telegraphers' Union, taking the same grounds against a wage reduction. The meeting will be resumed tomorrow morning.

WHEELS OF FORTUNE ABSENT FROM FAIR
