OF ANY BLAME Declares Council Has Been Warned Repeatedly of Menace to Life.

WARNING SIGNS POSTED

New Structure, With Breakwater, to Cost \$140,000, Defeated in Vote.

Declaring that the Ridout street bridge "is liable to go through at any time," and that he has repeatedly warned the city council of this menace to the life and property of London's citizens, City Engineer H. A. Brazier now declines to assume any responsibility in case the bridge does collapse.

The engineer informed The Advertiser today that the alleged strengthening of the bridge during the past two years merely consisted of replanking the roadway and tightening up a few struts to prevent hem from rattling. In his opinion, no strength was added to the bridge by this work, excepting that the new lanks "lessened the impact."

Following a statement made by Ald. Drake at a meeting of No. 2 committee of the city council Tuesday, to the effect that a private engineer had pronounced the bridge unsafe. Mr. Brazier was interviewed regarding the situation. Declare 1922 Outing Beats

When informed of the private en gineer's statement Mr. Brazier said: "Several engineers have expected the bridge to go through before now, but it is one of those inexplicable things of life that their prediction has not FOUR HUNDRED ATTEND yet been fulfilled."

Rents Market Space To Keep Other Dealers From Selling Chickens

As a rule tenants pay rent because they are compelled to in order that they may occupy quarters, but Market Clerk Charles Maker reports that there is a chicken dealer who has rented space on the market for five years without utilizing it in any way. "He has paid his rent for the last five years, but has not sold a chicken in the space rented during that time," said the clerk. "Why does he pay his rent?" he was asked by a member of the

"Just to keep the other fellows off," explained Mr. Maker.
