RESCUERS **ABANDON** SHAFT PLAN

All Spectators Ordered Away As Rescuers Reach New Tunnel.

At 2:55 o'clock this afternoon a despatch received by a local bond office declared Collins had been reached in the cave and was still breathing. The report could not be confirmed.

The tunnel exploration failed to disclose a passageway.

A tunnel, which the rescuers hope may lead to the cavern behind Floyd Collins, was discovered on the northwest side of the Sand Cave rescue shaft early today. Timbering was rushed on the fifteenth section and preparations made to drive piling into the side wall, around and above the tunnel hole, so a rescue party could enter it with safety.

The hole was first discovered about 1:30 a.m., and Carmichael, in charge of the shaft, and a doctor, were awakened. Meanwhile the diggers had uncovered a hole which seemed two or three feet high extending downward at a rather sharp slope. Their lamps were blown out by the down draft when they looked the hole.
