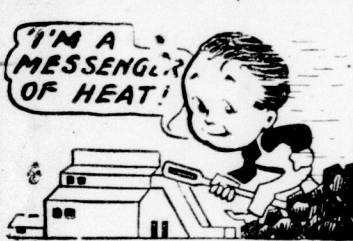

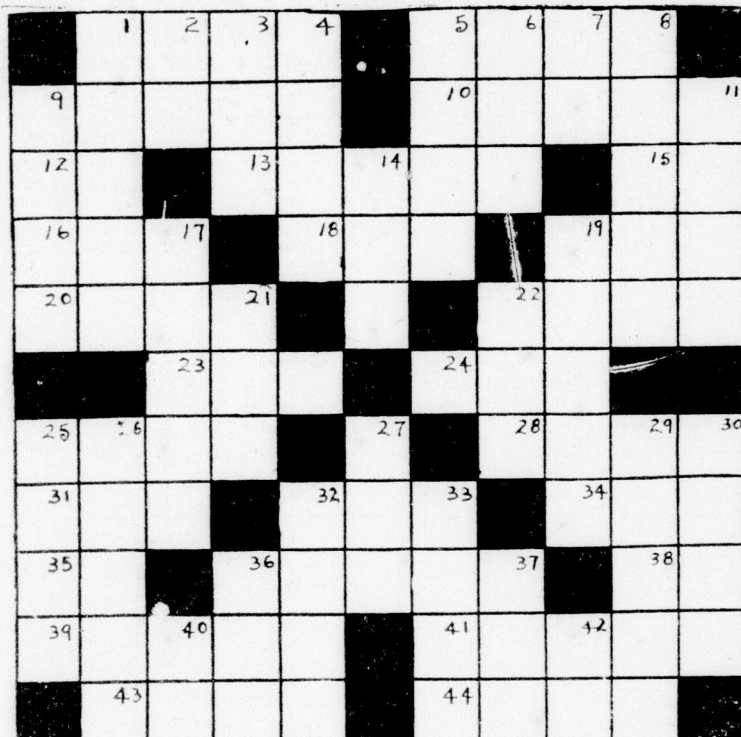

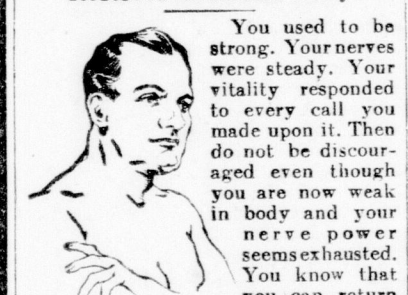

## PREMIER SWEARS HE IS INDEPENDENT OF WETS

Ferguson Declares Group of  
Twenty Had Nothing to  
Do With His Decision.

LIBERALS ARE FREE

Parliament Buildings, Toronto, Feb. 25.—The fundamental difference between Liberal and Conservative methods of party discipline was emphasized once more in the legislature this afternoon, when a second Liberal member, Edmund Proulx, Prescott, gave indorsement to the government's beer bill, thereby bearing out the truth of the declaration made last week by W. E. N. Sinclair that the party which he leads does not seek "to ward the conscience of its members when a vote is in prospect," and contrasting sharply with the manner in which the party whip is being cracked over the heads of wavering Tory members.

The opening of the session was enhanced by Mr. Ferguson's "Declaration of Independence" from the suggested dictation of the group of twenty wet Tory members. The government leader denied that the cabinet's action on the beer question was due to representations received from wet Conservatives, from the Moderation league or from any other quarter. The government, he said, had not even consulted its own followers, but had taken the initiative on the question of its own volition, and proposed to stand or fall by the result.

O. T. A. HOLDS FLOOR.

Toronto, Feb. 25.—Premier Ferguson took occasion today to say that there had been no presentation to the government by the 22 "wet" Conservative members who gathered in Toronto before the opening of the legislature to discuss the O. T. A., and that the government had not asked for and had not been influenced by any persons outside. The government, he declared, would stand or fall by its policy.

Dr. Monteith maintained that the premier had stood by every pledge he had made and that the most powerful arguments in favor of the proposed amendment were the words of the attorney-general that the Ontario temperance act must be revised or it was doomed.

Dr. Monteith touched on education, supporting the government's suggestion of better courses in high schools and colleges.

Proulx Speaks.  
Mr. Proulx said that he thought the premier on his part was strong. He hoped he had noted the "same liquor law" of that province. He would not accuse the premier of breaking his word because politicians often spoke too much and he thought the premier was in that position. Mr. Proulx explained that he was speaking for himself and not for his party.

He agreed with Attorney-General Nelles that there must be a strong public opinion behind a law before it could be enforced, and declared that the O. T. A. had bred hypocrisy and even perjury. Last year he had proposed five per cent beer, thinking it would decrease bootlegging, "but the premier laughed me out of court and told me to take my two classes of liquor law and go to the devil. I don't know whether 4.4 per cent is intoxicating or not. If not, it does not help the weak but they are satisfied the premier settled cheaply with them and the dregs are getting a bargain. If the prime minister is breaking his word he did not get to the limit and give government control? I think he would have been justified in giving it to the cities which voted so heavily in favor of it."

He asked the premier to amend regulation seventeen as he had done the O. T. A. and to treat minorities as Quebec treated the minority there. H. G. Nixon of North Brant (Progressive) asked if the sale of 4.4 per cent beer was the policy which was to please everybody why was not a question put on the ballot paper of last fall, covering this matter? Mr. Nixon suggested that the premier might submit the questions now, "and while he is at it, submit himself to the electorate."

Need Vote of People.

When the Progressive member said it always had been understood that no radical of fundamental changes were to be made in the act without a vote of the people, the premier asked him why radical and fundamental changes had been made by the former attorney-general and his present leader.

"These were all in the direction of enforcement," declared Mr. Raney. The premier denied that he had said at Sarnia that the act would not be changed one iota without a vote of the people. As minor changes had been made last session such a statement would be absurd, he said. Zotiue Mageau, Liberal member for Sturgeon Falls, took occasion in his address to explain the resolution passed by the council of Sturgeon Falls last November to the effect that the Ontario temperance act would not be enforced by the civic authorities.

## Factories Busy Many Get Work

Ottawa, Feb. 25.—That the February unemployment situation throughout Canada showed considerable recovery from the losses at the beginning of January is indicated by the reports of employers on February 1. Statements from 5,832 firms, employing 709,878 persons, gives an increase of 16,821 more than on January 1, 1925. Improvement in manufacturing was most pronounced.

It was the last act of the old council, he said, and did not express the views of the people of Sturgeon Falls.

Stronger Beer a Drug.

Continuing, Mr. Mageau said he believed that the 4.4 beer also would be a drug, though he was afraid he would have to vote for the bill when it was introduced in the House. In other times the old-time lager beer was considered a dangerous drink, and it was only 4 per cent beer.

On the Ontario temperance act, J. A. McCausland declared himself as a 4.4 beer concession, and he intended continuing his agitation for same liquor legislation. His advice to the premier was to bring down redistricting and go to the people on the issue.

Mr. McCallum (Progressive, South Bruce) took issue with the stand of his former party colleague, L. W. Oke, P. O. member for Lambton, when Mr. Oke, as Mr. McCallum said, assumed himself to be the Heaven-sent representative of the farming interests. He declared there was no desertion of the farmers by the Progressives.

Mr. McCallum spoke in favor of further provincial aid to the counties for highway purposes, and he greeted the decrease from 4 to 2 per cent in the interest rate at the provincial banks.

On the temperance act he believed that the premier had lived up to his promise, and classed as "bunk" the Conservatives' statement that they were introducing 4.4 per cent beer in the interest of the O. T. A. He was going to vote for both amendments.

Wants Hydro.

E. R. Wigie, Conservative member for Center Huron, urged the introduction of special agricultural training for farmers and girls in the public schools beyond the first few forms. "On hydro he believed there should be further contribution to rural hydro needs, and he believed that town dwellers who he believed to be specially and unfairly favored."

Coming to the Ontario temperance act, Mr. Wigie said that he always had objected to doctors issuing prescriptions and to druggists handling liquor. He believed that when liquor was required a man or a woman might be helped by a medical adviser. He applied for the liquor prescription make out the application himself, sign his name, and make a declaration before a justice of the peace that he wanted it for medical purposes.

Coming to the consideration of the consumption of beer, Mr. Wigie said: "I believe that if it does away with 50 per cent of the home-brew permits, the government would be justified in the amendment which they proposed."

## CONSTABLES HELD UP BY EDITOR, IS CHARGE

Montreal Journalist on Trial  
For Election Day  
Occurrence.

Montreal, Feb. 25.—Two burly provincial police constables, a deputy high constable, all armed, and a fourth man, were held up and driven at high speed in an automobile with their hands in the air from St. Martin street all the way to Westmount, where they were unceremoniously dumped out, according to the story in the court of special sessions here.

This happened November 5, election day in St. Ann's division, for the provincial legislature seat, and the accused is Roger Maillet, editor of Le Matin, a local weekly, who is charged with holding up the four, abducting them and preventing them from carrying out their duties. He is accused of "pointing a revolver with intent to maim, hurt or otherwise wound or injure" the three constables and the fourth man.

Whether the case is purely a political election day escapade or the more serious offence of Friday afternoon, when Judge Perrault is expected to deliver judgment, following the evidence for the defence.

**BRITISH EMPIRE STEEL  
FOUNDRY IS DESTROYED**

Firm's Oldest Building Prey  
To Flames Early in  
Morning.

Sydney, N.S., Feb. 25.—A spectacular fire, which broke out about 3:30 this morning completely destroyed the foundry, the oldest building on the plant of the British Empire Steel Corporation here.

The structure was of pine and burned furiously, casting a reflection that was seen at places 40 miles away. Two electric cranes, some machinery and some large castings were ruined, but the pattern shop with its valuable contents was saved.
