Wednesday Afternoon.

The council reassembled at 2 o'clock. Minutes of the forenoon session were read and confirmed.

An Hon. Judge McLatchey, H. A. Carr and D. A. Stewart were present they were invited to seats within the hall and asked to see forth the matter they had come to the council with.

The Hon. Judge McLatchey said that since he and the delegation which had visited the council the previous year, they had not had an opportunity of seeing the council for their own country in granting \$2500 yearly to the Soldiers' Memorial Hospital. He felt that it was his duty to come again and give a report of the hospital for the part of the year which had elapsed since its opening. His Honor then read a statistical report of said operations and concluded with a word of appreciation for the council's kindness and courtesy.

Messrs. H. A. Carr and D. A. Stewart also addressed the council briefly.

The account of M. A. Kelly, Clerk of the County, \$200.00 was taken up.

Mr. Kelly explained that last year \$200.00 had been deducted from his account because he had tried a number of cases one day. In these cases there was much preparatory work to get them in shape for trial and he received no pay for it. It is thought he should be paid so much per case.

Coun. Murchie said that six or seven of these cases had come up on one afternoon. The prisoners pleaded guilty and were sent up for trial. He thought the bill big enough with \$200.00 deducted and moved that it be paid less \$20.00—Motion carried.

Two additional accounts of the Public Lands and Building Committee were submitted, viz:

The Secy-Treasurer explained that he was yearly handling a very much greater sum of money than in former years and thought his bond for \$20,000 and that a check should be issued yearly for the premium—Carried.

Coun. Murray (Addington), moved that the Secy-Treas. be bonded with a bonding company doing business in the \$20,000 and that a check issue yearly for the premium—Carried.

items of the County of Restigouche, the town of Campbellton should be designated the shire town of the County of Restigouche instead of Dalhousie as at present so designated. And further resolved that the Legislative Assembly of the Province of New Brunswick be petitioned to pass an act at its next session making such change.

This motion on being put was declared carried, 9 for, 8 against.

Moved by Councillor Murray, (Addington), seconded by Councillor Dunlop, that whereas the franchise or privilege granted to certain corporations of developing, for their own benefit, the great water power of Grand Falls have lapsed or are shortly to expire by failure of such corporations to carry on any work towards the utilizing the said water power.

AND WHEREAS it is deemed to be in the best interest of this province of New Brunswick that the said water powers should be developed by the Government of this province and for the benefit of the people of this province.

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BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED that the Council of the Municipality of Restigouche now in annual January session assembled, ask the Government of this province not to renew any of the franchises or privileges heretofore or now enjoyed by such corporations; but that the Government themselves develop the said water powers and that this council appoint delegates to interview the Government in conjunction with delegates from the County of Madawaska and the town of Edmundston to urge upon the Government development of the said water powers—Carried unanimously.

Moved by Councillor Murray (Addington), seconded by Councillor Archibald that in the opinion of this Council the charter given by the local Government to the Kennel & Aurlight Co., granting to the said Company the exclusive right to operate the shale oil and gas deposits of the province should be forthwith abrogated, and that in future no exclusive rights or privileges be given to private companies or monopolists which would have a tendency to handicap the development of the natural resources of our province—Carried.

The usual \$10.00 fees for the N. B. Union of Municipalities were voted. Coun. Murchie moved that \$2500 be assessed for Board of Health purposes—Carried.

Ex-Coun. John Lawlor of Durham, was appointed chairman of the valuator in place of P. M. Shannon resigned.

The lists of parish officers for the various parishes as agreed to by the Council were adopted. All lumber surveys so appointed were given jurisdiction over whole county.

The Printing Committee was authorized to have the usual reports printed.

said ratemakers of the county of Restigouche have ample ground for all public buildings, instead of moving to Campbellton, where the same would cost about as much as a new court house, and the present jail would have to be abandoned adding about \$50,000 to the debt of the county over and above what is necessary if present site is used for a new court house—Carried.

NOTE—It will be noticed that this motion was moved by a councillor who voted in the minority, when three councillors who had previously voted for the motion were absent.
