FLYING THE UNION JACK.

Six Thousand Flags to be Furnished the Rural Schools.

Before the Christmas vacation it is expected that every rural school in the Province will be flying its own Union Jack.

The first consignment of these flags, purchased by the Provincial Government on the recommendation of the Minister of Education, has reached the Department, and the staff are sending them out in hundreds by every mail. They are being shipped to the various counties in alphabetical order. The flags are 6 feet by 3 feet in size, and are of the strongest material.

The list of rural schools to receive them has been made out, and totals nearly 6,000. With the flags will be forwarded a brief official letter suggesting plans for their use.
